Hobson's Choice.

There is not, at this time, the remotest chance of electing a Democratic county and legislative ticket. The election of any candidates, other than those nominated by the two Radical factions, would require from the Conservatives more time than they have, money which they cannot get, and a completeness of organization and unity of purpose which they do not possess. This, however, is no reason why the six or seven thousand Conservative voters should fold their arms and take no part in the contest. For four years the Conservatives in

Charleston county have vainly striven to defeat the Radical candidates. They have failed upon each occasion, and, if they were now to adopt the old plan of battle, they would fail again. The lesson taught by hard experience is, that the Conservatives must content themselves with small beginnings, and take what they can get where they cannot have what they desire; that the Conservative vote should be put where it will produce a practical result, instead of being thrown away in complimenting Democratic candidates who are set up to be knocked down. This is a reasonable, business-like view of the situation; it is plain hard common sense.

Neither the Mackey ticket nor the Bowen

ticket is worthy of the Conservative vote, and, as a whole, neither ticket can receive that vote. But if Democratic or Conserva tive nominations be made, or if the Conservatives stay away from the polls, the Bower ticket or the Mackey ticket will indubitably be elected. The success of the Mackey faction would give the people fairly good county officers, and a wretched set of representatives in the General Assembly. The success of the Bowen faction would impose upon the county an array of legislators and county officers many degrees worse than those who were chosen two and four years ago. The ob ject of the Conservatives, therefore, should be to defeat the two tickets, as a whole, and elect ticket made up of the least objectionable men on those two tickets. The struggle is hard, and the majority, as long as the fight is confined to the Republican factions, will be exceedingly small.
