STRYCHNIA FOR DISEASES OF THE

The Result of the Experiments of Professor J. J. Chisolm.

turther particulars. Attention was first attracted by Professor Nagel's (of Tubingen) reports of cases which appeared in the Centralblatt (a German periodical) during 1871. In
those cases it was shown that by the injection
of sulphate of strychnia under the skin surprising effects had been produced, and that
functional and organic diseases of the optic
nerve had been relieved quickly and permanently. In many of the cases improvement in
vision appeared to follow upon the very first
dose of the ermedy; and in a few cases of innetional derangement the complete restoration
of sight was established after three or four
doses of the strychnia administered under the
skin; but the whole quantity was not more

doses of the strychnia administered under the skin; but the whole quantily was not more than a minute fraction of a grain.

Dr. Chisolm, clinical professor of eye and ear diseases in the University of Maryland, at Baitmore, heard of these cures, and though he had himself relieved infirmity of sight by the use of strychnia, he thought it "nearly as possible to metamorphose oid age into youth as to give sight in case of nerve atrophy." However, he tried the remedy on the naval captain mentioned in the paragraph above recaptain mentioned in the paragraph above re-ferred to, and with complete success, although his case had previously been dismissed as in-curable. Some other cases were of that peculiar imperfection of sight known as "night-bilindness," extending in one instance over a period of seven months. After

After a few doses of the sulpnate of strychnia injecta lew doses of the sulphate of strychnia inject-ed under the skin of the arm night vision was so perfectly restored that at the end of ten-days the patient could read a newspaper by the gas when a few nights previously he could not see even the light uself."

So far as we can gather from Dr. Chisom's statements, he has not falled to afford relief in a single instance. His cure of the naval captain was not less wonderful than the cases reported by Professor Nagel; and after this, the doctor remarks: "In testing the use of strychnia in other cases of optic nerve atrophy, the effects seem nearly instantaneous upon the injection of the fluid under the skin. In nearly every instance the patient experienced the brightnening of the light in less than half a minute. In one instance, in which 1-40th of a grain in solution was accidentally thrown into a vein, the sensations of light, and a feeling of muscular twitchings, were apparently So far as we can gather from Dr. Chisom's into a vein, the sensations of light, and a feeting of muscular twitchings, were apparently simultaneous with the emptying of the syringe. I commence usually with the 1-60th of a grain, which I gradually increase to 1-30th, twice a day, in no case exceeding this last amount." The professor at Tubingen injects under the skin of the temple, but Dr. Ohlsolm prefers to inject in the arm; and we close our notice with his concluding words: "This treatment has now been tried in many cases, dolog with his conciuding words: "This treatment has now been tried in many cases, doing harm to none, and benefiting all more or less. Millions of Property Stolen and Hundreds of Murders Committed by the Greasers-4 Sample of the Protection

of California, two of the commissioners appointed by the President to take testimony relative to depredations on the Rio Grande, having returned to Washington to-day called upon the President and had a long interview with him. Congress at its last session appropriated six thousand dollars to pay the exenses of the commissioners. The President was much interested in the narrative of these gentlemen, who will prepare a final report for transmission to Congress, and was gratified at

the manner in which they had transacted the business with which they were entrusted. The incursions by armed Mexican bands into Texas have been numerous, and have con-tinued ever since 1859. They have, since that time, driven horses and cattle estimated to be worth seversi millions of dellars from Texan ranches across the river into Mexico, where the plunder is sold to soldier and citizen. Gene-ral Cortino, who is not at present in active military service, but on waiting orders, is represented to be one of the most active instiga tors of the incursions, by which he largely profits. The Texans while endeavoring to drive off the thieves are sometimes killed by the superior numbers of the Mexican bands, while occasionally the latter suffer in like man ner. Owing to these frequent incursions the border counties are in a state of excitement. There is only one company of cavalry on the frontier, which is of little use, con-There is only one company of cavairy on the frontier, which is of little use, considering that the distance to be guarded is eight hundred miles from the mouth of the Rio Grande te the extreme settlement. The inlantry is located along at intervals. The distance is nearly three hundred miles from Fort Brown to Ringgold barracks, with only one company lutervening. Some of the sufferers by the Mexican raids travelled two hundred miles to give their testimony and hundred miles to give their testimony and express their great satisfaction that prelimi-nary measures had been taken not only to project, but to indemnify them for losses, General McCook, commanding on the Rio Grande, corroborated the statement of the witnesses as to the boldness with which the witnesses as to the bonders with white the raids are made, and testified as to his inability, with an insufficient force, to give the required protection. But even if this were not so, principles are worth more than men. The Courier cannot sacrifice its judgment of political principle or right for the poor satisfaction of discriminating between tickets which our contemporary itself between tickets which our contemporary itself admits are "bad enough" and "infamous." This we believe to be the correct view, and in accordance with the sentiments of the community. At any rate, it will be the basis of our action. It is for the people to determine whether they will make an honest and earnest effort at redemption.
