Taking a Practical Turn-The Annual Fair-A Promise of a Grand Time-The Political Arena.

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

DARLINGTON, October 9. Before the war Darlington was noted for the conservatism, intelligence and high tone of its people. The wealthy citizen, enjoying a luxurious and dignified ease, often yielded to the allurements of literature, and ennobled his life by mental labors of no mean nor ordinary kind. His house was the abode of the highest social culture, of innocence and contentment. Even now, with his property swept away, he is animated by the spirit of the past. It is, therefore, not strange if the best citizens of the county, unable to adapt themselves to the new order of things, and profiting by the humiliating defeats of the past, should abandon the field of politics to the party in power, and devote their energies to other objects. While the negroes and their white masters are rioting in the excesses of political debanchery, they are quietly endeavoring to restore their private fortunes, and, in doing se, advance the material interests of the whole county, especially that of agriculture. Their efforts in this behalf have resulted in the formation of the Dar-

lington Agricultural Association.

This association is a joint-stock company, with a capital of nearly four thousand dollars. with a capital of nearly four thousand dollars. Its business, which consists chiefly in the holding of annual fairs, is conducted by a board of directors, and a secretary and treasurer elected by the stockholders. A tract of over a hundred ucres has been purchased about a mile from the village, ten acres of which are being enclosed and fitted up for the approaching fair. Two houses are in rapid course of construction, one measuring one hundred feet by thirty, with plazzas on three sides, and the other forty five by thirty. The circle designed for the exhibition of horses is a quarter of a mile in circumference, and in every way fitted for such purpose. Large and beautiful oaks, regularcomference, and in every way fitted for such purpose. Large and beautiful caks, regularity planted out; in the midst of which stood a residence of the olden time, cover the entire grounds, while a fine bed of grass offers a pleasant and inviting couch. The fair this year will commence on the 30th instant, and end on the first of November. It is already exciting great interest in this and the adjoining counties, and promises to be one of the most successful eyer held in the State.
