the disturbance -A rich English Catholic lady-a Mrs. Staleton-has just placed her country seat, near Warrington, at the disposal of sixty members of the Society of Jesus, driven from Germany, in order that they might open an educational establishment.

-The death is announced, at Calcutta, of the son of Tippoo Sahib, who died, aged seventy-nine years. He was about fifty years eld when his father besieged, for the second time by the English in Seringapatam, perished, sword in hand. Since that time he had lived in Calcutta, where he received an annual pension of twenty thousand dollars, paid im by the English Government.

-A curious example of military courtesy and of a desire to attain what is not always to be found a history which does not lie-is shown in the act of Field Marshal Von Moltke, who is sending to Marshal McMahon proofs of the work on the Franco-German war, written by the German general staff, in order that the French commander may correct any part of the work which may misstate the part taken in the campaign by the French marshal.

-A lady who met the author "Oulda" in London in fact, lived in the same house with war. her describes her as exceedingly eccentric. middle-aged, plain, but weird-looking, and drives in the most bizarre fashion. Her associates are entirely gentlemen. She makes pets of various uncanny animals, surrounds herself, with all manner of curious objects, keeps the most irregular hours, and generally es one as a cross between a soroeress

and a lunatic. The experiment of Mr. C. F. Sampson who, it was at one time thought, had brought the Philistines into North Adams, Massachusetts, in the shape of the Chinese laborers in his shoe factory, is reported by the Springfield "Union" to be a success. It is nearly two years since these Chinese were brought on by Mr. Sampson. Of the original fifty laborers first set at work forty-eight still remain, and are in all respects first-class workmen, industrious, faithful and reliable. During the time they have been employed they have so fully mastered the difficulties of their work as to be able at the present time to produce larger results every week than the same number of white hands were accustomed to do two years ago. They work steadily, ask for no holidays. and save their earnings to a miserly degree. We hear however, of no other manufacturer who, upon investigating the results attained by Mr. Sampson, has been led to employ the same labor. It is really curious to note the contrasts, both in California and Massachusetts, and measurably in other places, between the anticipations formed of the Chinese as laborers and servants, and the actual facts to-day.

-A gentleman from Malta by the name of M. Bugeja has been astonishing the fashionsble gamesters at Hombourg by certain recent operations in cards. These operations have been conducted greatly to his advantage and to the proportionate loss of the proprietors of the gambling establishments. It is well brown that many venturesome individuals take how'tual pleasure in deluding themselves with the idea that they have discovered a "system" by means of which they must infallibly win in their contests with chance. Armed with these systems, they confidently repair to the tables, like Thackeray's hero of the "wheel of fortune," and in like manner come to grief. The proprietors recognize in these persons their most profitable customers, and welcome them with cordislity. This M. Bugeja also had a system, and saked M. Blanc, the Hombourg proprietor. if he might stake 25,000 france at a time instead of 12,000, the usual limit, M. Blanc. forseeing a golden harvest, cheerfully consented, but what was his surprise and the surprise of the spectators to find that in twenty-two sittings the Maliese adventurer had won 1,000,000 francs. M. Blane then reduced the limit to the usual figure, when Bugeja affably remarked that his system required larger stakes, and prudently departed with his winnings. If Mr. Bugeja wishes to make another militon more quickly still, he should take out a patent for his discovery and offer it

for sale in america. -The Earl of Shaftesbury is building a new town for workingmen a short distance out of forget the devastation and ruin which fol-London. Small dwellings therein are rented for a sum at which it would be impossible to live in the city, except in a tenement house. The officers of the railroad running through the property have the good sense to run early and late trains, at low rates of fare, especially to suit the laborer. Fresh air, good water, and yards for the children to play in, between Ireland and England, at the begin-

and alleys, the squalor and toulness of the great city. The expense of living in Lord Shattesbury's village is no greater than in London, while access to work is even more convenient. The scheme has been, in fact, such a decided success, that the first stone for another town for workingmen has been laid on the line of the Chatham and Dover Rallways. The site has been purchased by an association of gentlemen, who will proceed to build on it twelve hundred houses, well constructed and thoroughly drained. Each house will have a little plot of land attached to it, and it is the design of the association to lease these houses to workingmen at a rent which will cover the interest and a portion of the purchase money, so that in a short term of years the tenants will have paid for the dwellings which they eccupy, when they are to receive deeds of the houses and land. The company is to build a hall for lectures, a library, a school-house, and other public buildings, while a large plot of ground will be reserved for a park. A co-operative store is also to be built, but public houses and drinking shops will be absolutely prohibited. If Mr. A. T. Stewart, with his Hampstead Plains, or other wealthy gentlemen of the over-crowded city of New York, would imitate this example, it might afford a solution of a difficult problem.

Than South Carolina no State gave to the omination of Horace Greeley a more cordial approval. And this was done when the Democracy in other sections of the country were holding aloof to watch the course of events, and to see whether the Liberal candidates were likely to receive a widespread support. The public presses of this State worked hard to secure the endorsement of the Liberal movement by the National Democratic Convention; the delegates from South Carolina were all Greeley men; the voice of the Conservatives in this State had a magical effect in suppressing dissension and promoting harmony of action. The deep underlying cause was that the South Carolina Conservatives desired to show unmistakably that they accepted in good faith the results of the war; that they earnestly prayed for the coming of a new era of reunion, reconciliation and peace. The time has come when they must again prove that they are incapable of double-dealing, and that their endorsement of Horace Greeley was no idle show.

The Presidential election is close at hand; and a Liberal electoral ticket, for South Carolina, is placed in nomination. It might have been difficult to secure a State convention promptly, or at all; and Presidential electors have been chosen by the Liberal and Democratic committees. THE NEWS would have preferred to see this work done by a convention of the people, but it is too late to talk of that now. . The electors are before the State; it remains to give them the largest practicable vote.

It is not pretended that South Carolina will be carried for Greeley, but, with energy and tact, such a result is by no means impossible. The Radicals are exhausted by the canvass through which they have just passed. They lie on their oars. A strong effort will roll up a Liberal vote which shall astonish those who think South Carolina is certain to go for Grant. The Conservatives are fresh and full of spirit. They owe it to themselves to go squarely to the polls. They can do no more than this; they can secure large number of colored votes for honest Horace Greeley. If the day is not won, let the Conservatives at least give to the Liberal candidates the largest vote polled for any anti-Radical ticket since the close of the

Poor Old, Ireland!

England must be hard run for sympathy when one of her most eminent historians thinks it worth while to cross the Atlantic and enlighten the American public upon the subject of Ireland. This is the mission which Mr. Froude has undertaken, and his first lecture in New York is evidence enough that a better man never advocated a more difficult and delicate cause. The lecture was replete with the literary graces of a highly-cultured mind, and with the strong, sturdy thought of English genius. The famous historian employed his learning and eloquence to convince rather than to amuse. He intends to make converts rather than to swell the throng of his admirers. He has left much important work at home, to do what he evidently regards as a yet more important work here. In considering the present condition of Ireland, and her continued unhappy relations with the dominant nation. Mr. Froude has set before himself the task of attacking the evil from the American side. Well nigh despairing that English statesmen can devise any futher measures effectual in making the nominal union of the three kingdoms a real one, he eloquently appeals to the United States to arbitrate between them, and to declare what it is right for England and for Ireland to do. Such an appeal is surely most flattering to his American audience; it is a manly recognition on the part of one of the foremost Englishmen of the time, of our power and sense of justice. But it will be difficult for even so subtle an intellect to devise any practicable method for such an arbitration, or to persuade us, even were such a method to be invented, that it would be a proper function for us to perform. England must settle her own domestic differences, as we settled ours; and would be as indignant with even a cousinly interference in them as we should have been in the time of our own civil war.

Mr. Froude's view of the Irish question is a thoroughly English one. He is willing to do anything within the limits of the present settlement to pacify and satisfy the subject island; but England "cannot and will not 'let go her hold upon an island lying close "by her side." He concedes that Ireland would have a right to her independence if she could conquer it and maintain it by force; but until she does that it would be self-destructive folly in England to permit a separation. Mr. Froude is familiar with the minutest details of Irish history, but there are some vital points in it which he either glances over or wholly omits. The Irish are a sensitive race, and they cannot easily lowed the conquest of the Plantagenets or the ruthless cruelty with which the Protector Oliver trampled her in the dust. And there is a still later and scarcely less rankling memory. No man knows better than Mr. Froude that the parliamentary union

form a sharp contrast to the crowded courts | ning of this century, was forced by fraud, violence, and an arrogant disregard of the will of the Irish themselves. That union is as hateful to them to-day as it was three-quarters of a century ago. O'Connell's whole agitation was for its repeal. Its repeal would not dissolve England's supremacy over Ireland, for England governed Ireland for centuries before the union was effected. For such a repeal, and for that only, the Home Rule party is now clamoring. Nothing short of it will satisfy Ireland, and perhaps that might not. To the American mind the differences between the two countries are irreconcilable.

The Question of Insanity.

This plea has become inseparable with al most every murder case tried in this country, and the more it is discussed the mor intricate it is made by the lawyers until any kind of passion which result in criminal violence is tortured into insanity. Recently in a Memphis court, in a trial for murder, a witness, Dr. J. K. Allen who had been a practicing physician for thirty years and the superintendent of the Kentucky Lunatic Asylum for ten years, and during that time had charge of two thousand lunatics, said: "The more I studied the question of in-"sanity, the less I understood of it; and if you ask me where it begins and where it ends, neither I nor any other physician in the world can tell you." This was Dr. Allen's scientific opinion of science; but he warmed up as he went on, and added: "On occasion like this, lawyers make fools of themselve "In trying to make fools of the doctors."

Men of Few Words

Some men use words as riflemen use bullets. They say but little. The few words used go right to the mark. They let you talk, and guide with their hands and face, on and on, till what you say can be answered in a word or two, and then they lance out a sentence pierce the matter to the quick, and are done. Your conversation falls into their mind as a river into a deep chasm, and is lost from sight by its depth and darkness. They will sometimes surprise you with a few words that go to the mark like a gunshot, and then they are silent again, as if they were reloading. Such men are safe counsellors, and true friends where they profess to be such. To them truth is more valuable than gold, while pretension is too gauzy to deceive them. Words without point, to them, are like titles vithout merit, only betraying the weakness of the blinded dupes who are ever used a promoters of other men's schemes.
