A BOAD QUESTION IN ORANGEBURG

TO THE EDITOR OF THE NEWS. The last Legislature passed an act chartering a road from Bamberg to a point in Orangeburg County. The act specifies that the direction of the road shall be by "the best and most direct route" between the two points, and entions certain individuals whose duty it is to see that this provision of the act is carried

mentions certain individuals whose duty it is to see that this provision of the act is carried out.

In the first place, the act itself is unconstitutional, as no notice of the intention of the petitioners to apply for the charter was given, prior to the passage of the act. In the second place, the route selected by the commissioners is not the best and most direct. In the third place, the citizens of Orangeburg, upon whom the burden of constructing the road and causeway falls most heavily, do not want the road.

Recently the county commissioners of Orangeburg applied for and obtained an injunction from Judge Graham, staying further work upon the road till the first day of January next. Since the granting of the injunction, petitions praying the next General Assembly for the repeal of the odious act have been circulated in Orangeburg County, and over five hundred signatures, mostly colored, have been obtained. The other side, however, have given notice of an intention to attempt to dissolve the injunction, and the case will be argued before Judge Graham within a week.

The only grounds upon which the defence have to base their arguments, are that the opening of the road will place a market and postoffice a few miles nearer a few individuals; that the route is already cut out, and the canseway partially constructed. This is partially true. The work done on the causeway up to this time, however, is labor thrown away. To work on it is impracticable, except when the river is very low, which will not be the case again before next summer or fall. The heavy rises of the South Edisto this winter will demolish the frail earthen dam which has been thrown up.

But grant that the opening and construction of the proposed road would confer a few benefits on a few individuals. POMPEH AND VESUVIUS.

Discovery of Oil in the Ruined City-Sympathetic Eruption of a Java Vol-Menacing Indications of a Fresh

adent of the Athenseum writes from Naples on the 28th ult.: I have to report a discovery which was made three weeks ago in Pompell. A glass bottle, well closed; has been found of oil in its made three weeks ago in Pompell. A glass bottle, well closed; has been found of oil in its natural state, the first and only reilc of the kind that has, as yet, been turned up. Eggs, and freit, and bread, and grain, rather overcocked, may be seen in the museums of Naples and Podapell, also large oil jars, and receptacles for it in the shops; but such a discovery brings in almost into the interior of a Pompelan household. It was some preclous stuff, perhaps, well scaled up, in reserve for salads which demand the finest oil. It may have been a sample. Whatever it was, it throws us into almost life communication with the thriving family who were destroyed by the cruption of Vesuvius. It has been submitted to the examination of Professor Palmier!, who was sationished at the marvellous preservation of the liquid, pure and clear as amber, and who debiared it to be olive oil without any extraneous matter. The recipient has the form of a large bottle similar to those which are commency found among us from the Greek to the Boman times, and would contain about on a large bottle similar to those which are commonly found among us from the Greek to the Roman times, and would contain about three chilogrammes of oil, equal to six or seven pounds weight. The contents are not, however, all liquid, for there is a portion, perhaps about the third part of the bottle, congealed, which has the consistency of virgin wax. Solid and inodorous, this residuum has no clearinous matter in it, say the experis. It is, as I have said, the first time that this liquid has been found in Pompell in such abundance and so well preserved, for the reason, perhaps, that the bottle was hermetrically closed with a cork and wax. On its being mouse, this stopper fell into the oil in a pulvefixed state, as also the material with which it was overed. For twenty-four hours, a shower of ashes fell on Sourabaya; producing an obscurity more intense than that occasioned by a colar eclipse, though the distance from the wolcano was more than than that occasioned by a colar colipse, though the distance from the volcano was more than 450 chilometres. The first dispatches announced the death of 156 persons, who were killed, some by the lava, others by the bolling water which, mixing with the ashes, formed torrents of mud. During the last month, Vesurius has shown evident signs of mallymity; on one day, for just half an hour, a column of smoke rose up as gigantic as that which was witnessed last April, and almost daily there is some demonstration of greater or less intensity. Professor Palmeri has not spoken, but, judging from appearances, our mountain is not satisfied with what it has done, and is more than half disposed to break done, and is more than half disposed to break out again. Last week two young men, a Neapolitan and a Roman, whose names are Neapolitar and a Roman, whose names are judiciately suppressed, performed one of those fooinardy tricks which cost so many their lives. They ascended the mountain, accompanied by ten guides, and entered the crater; but it required all the efforts of their satisfants to get them out again. The only glory obtained was that they were enabled to say they were the first to commit such an act of folly since the eruption.
