MURDER OF CHILDREN.

Infanticide in India-Female Children Destroyed—A Universal Crime—Terri-ble Statistics Given by English Of-Selals-British Rule in India.

The Central Provinces reports for 1870 supply the annexed account in regard to the prevalence of infanticide in that country: A regular village visitation was instituted, and evidence taken as to the proportion of boys and orbits and some other proportion of boys evidence taken as to the proportion of the vision and girts, and some other necessary facts. One magistrate reports having visited ninety-nine villages, inhabited by a clan whose head is the Rajan of Amorha. Eighty-six of the villages were "suspected." In seven villages inhabited by one caste, there were one hundred and four boys and only one girl, and that one girl had probably been saved by being brought up'll, her mother's family, altogether apart from her father. The Baboos of Asogpoor had twenty boys, and "no girl has ever been married from among them." In ten villages of another caste there was not one girl, and in another ten "a marriage of a girl is an unknown ceremony." Nearly all the families of the Baboos and Kours practice the crime, with the exception of Luckmunpore, who had twenty boys and twenty-one girls—a most twenty boys and twenty-one girls—a most twenty boys and twenty-one girls—a most twenty-boys and twentyand girls, and some other necessary

CHINESE POLITICS.

A recent writer in a German newspape gives the following particulars of the present condition of affairs in China:

condition of affairs in China:

The emperor is yet a minor in years, and the State is governed by a regency, of which Prince Kung in the head. The empress-mother is described as an able, energetic and ambitious woman, who is also of the regency. The present issue at court is between Prince Kung and the empress-mother. The former and his party wishes the young emperor to be procealined of age on the occasion of his approaching marriage, and that he should then assume the government in person. It is said the boy emperor is disposed to cultivate friendly relations with foreign powers, and Prince Kung supports the claim of the foreign diplomatists to be allowed direct and personal communication with the sovereign. It is suggested that the regent is anxious to rid himself of the responsibility of the Regency, particularly in view of the hostility of the party of the Impress, who proposes to keep: the Emperor a minor two years particularly in view of the hostility of the party of the Emperor a minor two years to keep; the Emperor a minor two years longer, during which time he must remain under maternal tutelage. She is represented as extremely anxious lest she should lose her power and influence the moment she gave up the reins of government. She has been able to defeat any action by the regency on the question of admitting foreign ambassadors to the Emperor's presence, by having it postponed for decision by the Emperor when he is admitted of age. This question, which divides the Chinese Government at this time, is one which in past time has agitated various one which in past time has agitated various European courts. The mother of Louis XIV undertook to continue her authority over the boy king, as did Catharine de Medicis over her three sons, who successively were Kings of France. But the Emperor of China is not likely to prove a Louis XIV; he is represented to be a mere child as far as mental develop-ment and worldly knowledge is concerned; he is fond of fine clothes and theatrical pageantry, in which matters he is gratified by his

A large intrenched camp between Tientsin and Taku is to be provided with six huge Krupp guns which have been received from Europe. 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
