THE CALDWELL HOMICIDE. Release of Captain Tupper Upon a Thousand Dollars Bail.

A motion was made yesterday morning before Judge Graham, in the Court of General Sessions, for the release on bail of Captain George Tupper, who is charged with killing Captain John D. Caldwell, on the 21st of last September.

The poem not only shows no sign of flagging interest or waning power in the narrator, but is as fresh in incident, as rich in fancy and more free from all trace of overstrained sentiment than most of the others.

The story is not weighted with any of those moral problems that Tennyson sometimes broods over in his verse. It tells no metaphysical and opens up no vistas of speculation; but tells directly, though with much beautiful illustration, the tale of a bright and good boy whose sole thought and desire is to become a knight of Arthur's court.
