THE ELECTION TO-DAY.

Remarkable Apathy on the Part of the Grantites.

The election which is to be held to-day al over the country for a President and Vice-President of these United States promises to be, so far as Charleston is concerned, the quietest and tamest affair of the kind that has ever been witnessed here. In comparison with the herculean and unscrupulous efforts of the Grantites in other parts of the country, and even in certain sections of this State, to carry their point by every variety of force and frand, the marked apathy which the party gers in Charleston are now displaying is traly wonderful. A Grant and Wilson mass meeting was ordered to be held in Charleston last evening for the purpose of stirring the Badical cohorts up to the voting point, but no mass meeting was held, and upon investigation, it was found that the Radical State executive committee which ordered the meeting had failed to send the money for its necessary expenses, and the local Radical politicians did not feel sufficient interest in the matter to expend the thirty or forty dollars that would have been required to get up the demonstration. Another curious instance of the spathy of the Grantites is found in the fact that several of the ballot-boxes have not yet been sent out to the precincts in which they belong, and the chances are, therefore, that in several of the country precincts there will be absolutely no polls and no election. The managers at those preclucts have not yet been paid for their time and expenses at the recent State election, and they consequently have not taken the trouble to come to the city to get their boxes for the Presidential elec-

In the city the boxes have all been distributed, and the polis will be opened at the places advertised, at six o'clock, this morning, and kept open until six o'clock, this afteron. The managers, supervisors and deputy marshals who acted at the State election be on duty to-day, and the same general rules will be observed in conducting the election. There having been no registration of voters, any oldizen of the county can vote once where ever he may please, or wherever he may happen to be. The only persons to be voted for in this county are seven electors for the State of South Carolina, who will be empowered to cast the vote of this State for the President and Vice-President of the United States.
