When iron ships were first introduced, now twelve years ago, it was expected they would drive all wooden ships from the ocean, and bring about such a revolution in marine architecture that timber for shipbuilding would become one of the things of the past. These expectations were founded upon what appeared on very correct data, for it was readily de monstrated that an iron ship would carry conmonstrated that an iron ship would carry considerably more than a wooden vessel of the same outside measurement, also that they would last longer and that the possibilities of fire were materially lessened. Iron vessels were immediately constructed, and as rapidly as possible, that they might at once share the profits of the commerce which it was believed they were desirated to command.

As these vessels left the shipyards they were given by the various Lloyds the very highest classification, and were rated in meny instances for twenty-one years.

Numerous excumstances have been conducted to this result, but it has been brought about this play the fact that many of the iron ves-sels that, twelve years ago were rated for twenty-one years, are now worn out and nothing more than their weight as old

It is a well known fact that the instant iron and that this process is accelerated by the action of sea, water is evident. The outside of the vessel showever, can be protected by constant painting, and kept comparatively free irom rust, but on the inside, where there is always a maisting created by the vessel's own awais. rust, but on the inside, where there is always a moisture created by the vessel's own sweating, the plates and bolts are gradually eaten away. Paint and tar are always freely used, and all accomplations of water promptly removed but the bilge is always wet, and the nitimate destruction of the iron is a mere matter of time. When a plate of iron is rusted through a greater difficulty still is encountered in the attempt to repair it. Each rivet must be out out, and when the plate is finally removed it is seldom that the adjoining metal is in a condition to hold the new one. Thus other plates must be taken out, and, as in an instance that occurred recently at this port, that congred recently at this port. Instance that occurred recently at this port, the entire bottom must be removed. In the case referred to this was necessary, and when all the repairs were effected it was found they amounted to almost as much as the original cost of the vessel. These circumstances have induced many of the leading shipping houses to turn their attention to wooden ships, and more orders havelbeen sent to the Eastern shippards within the past six months than in as many previous years.

as many previous years.

There are; however, many conflicting opinions relative to the rival merits of wood and ions relative to the rival merts of wood and iron, and each material has its own supporters, who press its claims and condemn the opnosition. Notwithstanding the facts demonstrated by experience, each party holds to its own ordinious, and refuses to concede to the other the preference. Wooden ships are held by many to be out of date and too cumberby many to be out of date and too cumbersome and unwieldly to be compared with iron ships, and in support of their theory urge that an iron vessel, will carry several tons more freight and from a hundred to one hundred and fifty barrels more than a wooden vessel of the same general outside measurement. This is of course a great desideratum to the shipper, because all the additional ireight a ship will hold is so much extra profit. It is also disimed that an iron ship will command better rates for freights, and that in general they are more profitable. In relation to the difficulty of making repairs and the fact that many iron ships rated for twenty years are now worn out, it is said that the vessels were constructed hastly, and that a poor quality of iron was used, while, with better material, repairs would not be needed.

Those who favor wooden ships combat all these points, and claim the preference for reasons which they urge experience has demonstrated. In the first place, they point to the original cost of a wooden ship, which is one-third less than that of an iron ship, and urge that as an iron vessel can only be insured.

one-third less than that of an iron ship, and urge that as an iron vessel can only be insured against total loss, the additional expense will more than counterbalance the higher rates obtained for freight and the extra carrying capacity. A well built wooden vessel will last from twelve to fifteen years, and the necessary repairs can be made upon her in a short space of time and at a small expense. The danger to be apprehended from a collision or other accident is also less than with an iron ship, for the acoident that would make a wooden ship spring a leak would oreak a hole in an iron ship, or at least do her so much-damage as to render lies than garous to life and property. An accident to a wooden ship may at times be readily repaired even while at sea; but the sides of an iron ship precludes the use of hammer and nails; and unless a hole can be stopped by stuffing, she is bound to go to the bottom.

A remarkable instance of this difference between the two materials occurred a short time ago... A wooden wessel, while in a foreign port settled ather moorings owing to an extremely low tide. She leaked slightly on the voyage, and upon arriving at this port was put upon a lary dock for repairs. It was then found that she had settled upon a large boulder, which was wedged into her wooden bottom so firmly that she carried it the entire voyage, and that wittout any particular inconvenience. Such an occurrence to as fron ship world inflorabledly have feen disastrous. It may be said that good fron would have settled upon the some without breaking, but if her bottom had been weakened by rust and given away at all, she must have sunk.

These differences of opinion will undoubtedly continue, but it is a fact that there has recently been a remarkable development of business in the wooden shipyards, and with it a failing off in the demand for iron vessel. The Delaware yards just now are quite busy, but no new orders are coming in. The builders of that locality claim that they can construct iron sitips and steamers within twelve per cent, exclusive of the gold premium, of what they would cost on the Ciyde, and that this margin would be enturely removed if the same inferior quality of iron was used as that employed in the construction of English ships. Even at these rates, however, iron ships are not in demand, but most of the wooden shipyards op the New England coast are pressed with work. Goorge Thomas, at Quincy, is now engaged upon a fine ship of nineteen hundred tons, which will son be ready for lauroching. At Essex Messrs, James & McKenzle have Just begun a three masted schoomer of five hundred and a fity tons, and Captain, N. L. Many well informed persons predict that iron shipbuilding will never become a popular industry, in this country, inasmuch as wood can be used to much advantage, besides being cheaper and equally serviceable. While our forests later it is said our true policy is to build wooden ships, but if we must import wood as England coes, it may turn to our advantage to use iron. Under the present press of work many predict that our commercial navy will soon be rebuilt with a class of vessels as good and as serviceable as those of other nations.

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

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PUBLICATION OF ALL LEGAL AND PUBLIC NOTICES.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same: It shall be the duty of the Attorney General, the Comptroller General and the Secretary of State conjuintly, to designate by public notice [in] one or more newspapers by the State, in which all legal notices, advertisements, or publications for the State of any and every character required by law to use made public shall be published; and said attorney-General. Comptroller-General and secretary of State shall have power to make such changes and new designations from the to time, as they may indge that the public interest required.

SEC. 2. 
