The Horse Disease Crippling Commerce in our Sister City.

The following extracts from the Savannah papers of yesterday will give some idea of the state of affairs resulting there from the visitation of the "epizoot." Our sister city was a little too fast in crying out about the difficulty of transportation in Charleston. There has not been a day since, the disease began on which merchandise of any description coming to this city was delayed for ten minutes at wharf or railroad depot in consequence of the disease. Savannah has been far less fortunate. The Advertiser says:

"Shanks' mare" is now the only equine "Shanks' mare" is now the only equine available for trotting purposes. The horse disease fairly leaps in its progress. Many of the dray horses that were in use yesterday wore red stockings, and oeeded handkerchleis badly. It was cruel to allow such horses to work. All the doctors, policemen, \$\varepsilon\$ "into and procedurate were on foot. The Bay and merchants were on foot. The Bay and wharves seemed almost like a Bunday thoroughfare. It is likely that not a horse will be seen at work within a few days.

The Republican savs: The horse disease has been slowly and inaldiously gaining ground, and now its effect upon trade has been shown unmistakably. For several days past the street railroad has been diminishing its number of cars, and now an entire estoppage seems imminent. The effect on the transportation of cotton has been very marked. Prices for drayage have effect on the transportation of cotton has been very marked. Prices for drayage have risen fitty per cent., and yesterday it was found necessary to employ steam in removing cotton from the yard of the Central Railroad to the Bay. Orders for coal and wood remain upon the books of dealers undelivered, and unless we have an influx of oxen, or a substitute in the way of hand-carts some suffering may be the consequence. For the past (w) days or more, horses fit for ser-vice have appeared on the streets under cover.

vice have appeared on the streets under cover, and one team we came across in our wanderings was adorned with a roil of red fiannel around the neck like a brilliant scarf.

The Traction engine of Captain old. Goodwin was engaged at the wharf of the Baltimore stramer yest-rday morning in bauting a truck loaded with cotton. On level ground it worked well enough, but when she came to up-hill work it stalled, and the truck had to be pushed up by hand. It is bad enough to have a baulky or stalling horse at any time, but when we come to the substitute, steam, and find it baulky too, we must pray for the horse maindy to cease.

A gentleman engaged in business in Savannah, who arrived here yesterday, reports that draymen there are charging one dollar per bale for transporting cotton from the depots to the steamships. Send your cotton to Charleston, gentlemen, and save delay in transportation and exorbitant charges for draying.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Kepresentatives of the State of South Carolina now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same: it shall be the duty of the Autorney-General, the Comptroller General and the Secretary of State, conjointly, to designate, by public notice [in] one or more newspapers in this State, in which all legal notices, advertisements, or publications for the State of any and every character required by law to be made public, shall be published; and said Attorney-General. Comptroller-General and Secretary of State shall have power to make such changes and new designations from time to time, as they may indge that the public interest required.

SEC. 2.
