The Charleston Market. FOR THE WESE ENDING THURSDAY, DEC. 5 1872. THE CROPS .- For several days during the first of the past week a sharp cold change prevailed, but afterwards the weather was more moderate. The period has generally been of a character to enable crop gathering to proceed under fair conditions. The various establishments for the nanufacture of fertilizers in this vicinity are making extensive arrangements for an increased supply of their valuable manures, which are in growing demand in all parts of the South. Their great success heretofore promises a large in-

crease in their use during the coming season. THE RECEIPTS.—The arrivals at the cotton ports for the week up to Friday last were 134,429 bales, against 118,565 bales the week before, and 122,126 bales for the corresponding time last year, At New Orleans the supplies were 39,739 bales, in contrast with 44,606 bales for the week of the year previous. The total receipts at the cotton ports from September 1, 1872, up to the latest dates, were 1,240,862 bales, against 963,865 bales for the time the previous year—showing an increase of 276,187 bales.
