Wires Down, The weather yesterday was cold enough to have satisfied the inhabitants of a far more Northern clime than this. About eleven o'clock, on Tuesday night, a severe sieet storm began, which however subsided, after a short time, into a steady rain that continued through the greater part of the night, and was accompanied by an occasional fall of sleet.
