-Helmbold is living very quietly in the uburbs of Philadelphia, and has the calm satisfaction of knowing that he owes more creditors than any other man living or dead. The reichsmark, the new German Imperist coin, is about equal in value to the English shilling or twenty-four cents in gold. Heretofore these coins have been quoted by New York bankers in groups of three or four—thus seventy-two cents gold for three reichsmarks, or ninety-six cents gold for four reichsmarks. A movement, however, is on foot to give the price in the New York market of the single reichsmark, so as to avoid the confusing meth-

-It will be interesting to the public to learn that there is a prospect that the longdelayed postal cards will soon be issued. Congress authorized them last June, but failed to make an appropriation to pay the expense of engraving and printing. The Postmaster-General estimates that \$100,000,000 of the cards will be used in a single year, and to pay for the number that will probably be demanded between now and the 1st of July the House asked an appropriation of \$60,000 among the tems in the dedctency bill. The bill will pass before the holiday recess, and the cards will probably be ready soon after the 1st of January.

Private advices from New Orleans are to the effect that the contest has brought every department of business and industry to a stand-still. A deep gloom pervades the entire city. The prospect for the remainder of this winter, therefore, is anything but a cheerful one, and the end is not yet.

The New York Court of Appeals has deolded that the usury laws of the State of New York apply to the transactions of national banks on contracts made in the State, and that a violation of such laws subjects the offending bank to the penalty they impos The decision hinged upon the case of the First National Bank of Whitehall against James Lamb and others, the defendants pleading usury to resist payment of a promissory note. The judge at circuit gave a verdict for the plaintiff, holding that the State laws against usury did not apply to national banks. This decision the Court of Appeals set aside, declaring the defence of usury available, and

orders a new trial. At seven o'clock, Monday evening, John Simmons and Nicholas H. Duryea, well known lottery dealers, engaged in a desperate struggie in front of a restaurant on Liberty street, New York. Simmons succeeded in throwing Duryes, and then stabbed him repeatedly with a dirk capsing almost instant death. Simmons, after the homicide, took refuge in a neighboring saloon, where he was arrested soon afterwards; but in getting away he fell, fracturing the lower bones of his ankle. Simmons and the body of his victim were brought to the police station, where Simmons refused to make any statement when interrogated by the officer in charge, and persisted in his refusal when visited by reporters. Duryea was about thirty years of age, of genteel appearance light build, and lived at Port Richmond, Staten Island, where he leaves a wife and two children. The cause of the fatal quarrel is not known, but it was supposed to be connected with the lottery business, in which

eneral Sherman was examined before the American and British claims commission in Washington, on Tuesday last, in regard to the burning of Columbia. He denied that he had issued orders to burn Columbia, but admitted that the army was greatly exasperated against South Carolina, and this exasperation was greatly increased by General Hampton's command firing into his camp a night or two before entering Columbia, which exasperation he and his officers participated in, and this was known to the men. A correspondence was then shown to General Sherman purporting to have taken place between him and General Halleck while on his march to Columbia. The communication from Halleck desired him to destroy Charleston and sow it with salt, so there might no more nullification and secession grow up there. To this Sherman in reply wrote that Charleston and Columbia would soon be in his hands, and Halleck would have no cause to complain of his treat-ment of them. That he had the Fliteenth Corps with him, and that corps did their work well; and further, that he (Sherman) would not spare the public buildings at Columbia as he had at Milledgeville. General Sherman admitted, on his examination, that this correspondence was authentic. He stated that he occupied Columbia with the Fifteenth Corps. In reply to the question whether he kept the men in ranks after taking possession of the city, he said, "No." He could not have done so to have prevented the burning of every town in the State of South Carolina. These reports were drawn out by the representatives of the British claimants, who al. lege that their property at Columbia was destroyed wantonly and in violation of the usages of war.
