-Mr. Augustin Daly, who was burned out of the Fifth Avenue Theatre on Wednesday, will, it is said, lease the Broadway Theatre "as quickly as arrangements will permit."

-Tea is reported to have been successfully cultivated in Iowa. -The Attorney-General of Florida, Judge J.

P. Emmons, is totally blind. -The Emperor William of Germany is expected to visit St. Petersburg during the present winter.

-Lieutenant-General Von Kamecke will succeed Von Roon as minister of war for Prussia. The latter, it is understood, will be made a field marshal. -Hundreds of agricultural laborers, out of

employment in England because farmers refuse to pay the wages they demand, are preparing to emigrate to Brazil.

-There were in New York city, during the past year, one hundred and forty suicides, two hundred and six deaths by drowning, fiftyseven homicides, and seven hundred and five deaths by accidents. -The ex-Emperor Napoleon is reported to

have expressed pleasure at the late doings at Versaliles. "M. Thiers," he added, "Is playing my game, and he is doing it so well that I shall be recalled to France even sooner than I could wish." Il saute pour mieux reculer,

-A man named L. Watson, said to be a native of Savannah, Georgia, and Benjamin Crowder, an Englishman, have been tried at Hungary," and the former sentenced to six months' imprisonment, for remarks not considered complimentary to the Emperor of Austria, and the latter to three months, for resisting arrest on same occasion.

Oertificates of all the Presidential electoral colleges have now been received at Washington, either at the office of the Vice-President or department of State. Beveral of the messengers arrived Tuesday, thus barely escaping the forfelt of one hundred dollars for fallure to deliver their respective certificates by the first of January.

-There has been a conflict on a question of etiquette between General Sherman and the secretary of war. The general of the armies, it is alleged, claims that his orders should emanate directly from the President, and not come through the war office, as is sometimes the case. There was some discussion on this point between General Rawlings and General Sherman. It is represented that now, as on the former occarion, General Sherman has succeeded in maintaining his position.

-The Japanese Government continue to recruit men of science in Germany. Dr. Hilgendorff, senior professor of the Polytechnic Institute in Dresden, and Secretary of the Leopoldina-Carolina in the same city, formerly director of the Zoological Gardens, Hamburg, has accepted the chair of natural science in the School of Medicine at Jeddo. Dr. Cochins, formerly attached to the Victoria College in Berlin, has also been called as a professor of physics and chemistry in the same

An Annapolis paper, alluding to the young colored cadet, says: "Young Conyers, who was at one time supposed to fare rather roughly from his sompanions at the academy, meets now with very kind treatment, so far as being treated with entire civility is concerned. abilities is of the highest character. -The new army uniform, worn for the first time by the officers on New Year's Day, at the President's reception, attracted much attention. The Washington Star says: It is very showy, and the plumes of the various branches of the service are designated by different colors. The coat is of dark blue cloth, double-breasted, with a skirt extending from onehalf to three-fourths of the distance between the hip and the knee. Staff officers wear pants of dark blue cloth, without stripe; other officers wear light blue pants, with atripe of similar color to that of the facings of their respective arms, except for infantry officers, where the stripe is of dark blue. General Sherman wore two rows of buttons on the breast of his coat, placed in fours. He wore epaulettes, and his plume consisted of three white ostrich feathers. Other general and staff officers wore three black ostrich feathers, and regimental officers wore plumes of horse halr or cock's feathers, of a color similar to the trimmings of their coats. General Sherman and the general and staff officers wore chapeaus; light artillery and cavalry officers, black felt helmets, with gold cords and tassels and gilt trimmings; other officers, dark blue cloth hats. Generals Babcock and Dent were attired in full dress sults, and not in uniform, as heretofore.

National Wealth and National Debt.

The whole world is straining to get rich, and succeeding, too. All civilized nations, recognizing the power of wealth as an agency of war, are engaged in a competitive task of developing their resources, accumulating capital, and multiplying the in. struments of production. Our own country exhibits this tendency in a wonderful degree. The aggregate of estimated wealth in the United States, which was seven milliards (7000 million) of dollars in 1850, had grown to sixteen milliards (16,000 millions) in 1860, and to thirty milliards (30,000 millions) in 1870. It is now, probably, about forty milliards. A man who doubles his capital in ten years is considered very prosperous; yet here is a whole nation nearly doubling its wealth in a decade, and that, too, notwithstanding a war which destroyed 9000 millions of property and 300,000 producers of wealth. In the two decades be tween 1850 and 1870, the increase has been more than quadrupled. Other nations. also, though not increasing in the same enormous ratio as ourselves, are exhibiting the same tendency. The vast machinery of Great Britain is maintaining that country as the richest on the globe; the French, with their surprising ingenuity and industry, are managing to pay to their conquerors the 1000 million dollars indemnity, and at the same time to exhibit a larger commerce than they ever had before; Germany is beginning to add to its old sturdy prosperity a splendor and extravagance that the Germans of twenty years ago did not dream of; Russia is developing her resources at a remarkable rate; even Turkey is growing rich, and Japan and China, catching the wealth fever, are be-

ginning to borrow the improved economical and productive agencies of other countries to increase their wealth. The soil, rocks, minerals and waters of the earth are being cransformed into comforts, luxuries and permanent capital for the use of man; and if human beings are to be made happy by wealth, it would seem that the dawn of an age of universal happiness is upon us. But this is only one side of the picture ; there is another, the contemplation of

first. The world is plunging into debt at an enormous rate. The growth of wealth has the same effect upon nations that it has upon individuals; it engenders extravagance and induces them to contract debts that serve as perpetual mortgages upon their incomes; and it begets the lust of power that leads to war. The following table, compiled from official sources, exhibits the comparative debts in pounds sterling of twenty-seven governments in 1862

and in 1872: STATE DEBTS AND THEIR INCREASE (ENCLAND EXCEPTED) DURING THE LAST DECADE.

Total...1,493,100,000 3,875,800,000 1,382,700.000 The debt of Great Britain is omitted because there has been no increase in it. Of the twenty-seven governments here mentioned, only one, Holland, has decreased its debt in the last ten years; nearly all the others have increased theirs, and the aggregate increase amounts to the enormous sum of \$5,413,000,000. In other words, they have more than doubled their aggregate indebtedness in ten years. The total debts of these governments amount, now, to \$16,779,000,000, a sum equal to the entire wealth of the United States in 1860. Our own is the only one of these governments that is attempting to reduce its debt by fair payments; of the others, some, like order to suit the requirements of the later Turkey and Spain, not only regularly increase their debts by annual deficiencies, four Austrian battallon flags, for each of but borrow money to pay the interest; and others, still, like Mexico and some of the South American States, pay no interest at all. Brazil pays \$275,000,000 for the conquest of Paraguay; France pays \$2,000,from the Cabinet is no longer a question of 000,000 for her mad attack on Germany in doubt. He has decided, against the wishes of 1870; and Spain pays \$780,000,000 for the revolution which gave her a new dynasty, for the disorders that followed, and for the Caban insurrection; and Russia and Egypt pay large sums for the internal improvements which both have executed in the last ten years. If the coming decade shall bring wars such as we witnessed in the last, and the debts of the governments of

the world continue to increase at this rate,

Agricultural Co-operation.

The triumph of the idea which found expression at Rochdale, England, in 1844, when twenty-eight poor weavers put their shillings together and agreed to do without 'middlemen," has prompted an application of the principle now, after nearly thirty years' waiting, to a solution of Great Britain's agrarian difficulties. Early in the present year the experiment of a co-operative farm will be commenced at Leistwardine, in Herefordshire, and anxiously watched by all those who see how inopera tive for the greatest good of the greatest number the present system of conducting the agriculture of the realm is. An estate of one hundred and fortytwo acres has been purchased through the efforts of Mr. Morrison, member of Parliament from Plymouth, and this is to be let to thirty laborers at \$100 a share, \$50 to be paid up. This will be only a paid up capital of \$1500, but it is expected to be supplemented by the extra muscular strength and toil expended by the poor man when working for himself. The Rochdale venture has now among its artisans 600,000 members; is worth \$600,000, and trades annually to the extent of over \$5,000,000, their sale of butter each week being \$3000. The baronet who presided over the meeting which orgnized this later co-operative scheme, told his audience that it was the beginning of a large movement in the country, and only in that way could the present rents of farms be at all maintained.

Within Eighty Miles of the Moon.

From the two "spectacle glasses" which formed the first telescope made by Hans Lippersheim, of Middleburg, to the grand telecopes of the present day, what a stride has been made! Galileo's first instrument magnified "three" times, but a telescope has just been put up which magnifies three thousand times, that is to say, it draws the visibility of distant objects like the moon three thousand times nearer. The object-glass of this instrument is twenty-five inches in diameter, and is said to be the largest in the world, except one now being constructed for the United States, which is to be twenty-seven inches. By the telescope already set up, the moon is brought practically within eighty miles of the sight of

Poor Ireland!

The latest Irish agricultural statistics were possibly not in Mr. Froude's possession when ne was lecturing in this country against home rule. Here is a sad showing for the present rule. Three thousand eight hundred enumerators, selected from the Royal Irish constabulary and the Dublic Metropolitan police, having visited six hundred thousand holdings, declare a decrease of 134,915 acres in the extent of land under crops in the present year. The decrease in cereal crops is 33,361 acres. The returns of emigrants from the several ports of Ireland for the first seven months of 1872 record an increase of 5840 persons over the same number of months in 1871. In 1861 the number of fourth-class houses in Ireland each of which had but one room for the entire family, of every age and sex, was 89,374. These were occupied by half a million of human beings.

Napoleon's Friends.

The second volume of the private the Emperor, found at the Tuileries, has, according to a short notice in that admirable little paper, the Courier des Etats Unis, been published. It is devoted to detailed accounts of the German correspondence of the Emperor. It is a curious melange. Insults and flattery; appeals for help, and offers of invaluable as sistance; vendors of patent medicines to cure the malady under which he was known to be nich materially mars the radiance of the suffering; obsequous crookings of the most servile of knees; almost the old bowing in the dust that halls the ancient Roman Emperors as gods; "Arbiter of Europe," "Liberator of "Italy," "Pacificator of the World," all are there; his "health is indispensible to the repose "of mankind," and his life the "most precious "of all existences." Almost all of these writers ask for some favor. One of the most curious of these letters is from some German professors. They sign themselves "The hum-"ble servants of your Imperial Majesty," and they respectfully offer a piece of meteoric stone, which his Majesty may like to keep in his waistcoat pocket as a protection against "rhoumatic pains." It is a humiliating exposure of human abasement. The Emperor, of course, did not read all these letters. That was the lot of his unfortunate secretary. No wonder that Mecquard was a cynic.
