A BAILROAD RUN-OFF.

The Entire Train off the Track-No One Injared and Damage Small. The passenger train on the Northeestern Bailroad, due in Charleston at 3 P. M., yesterday, ran off the track when about seven miles from the city. The engine and the entire train is off. But little damage was done to either engine or cars. The road, however, is literally torn up for about one hundred and fifty yards, the iron being bent and the cross-iles destroyed. No one was injured. A large force was at once set to work to repair the track, but this could not be done in time to permit the passage of the Northern-bound train last evening; and it is doubtful if any

trains will be able to pass the break this forenoon. The accident was caused by a spreada bar of iron. A train will be sent up to meet the down-trains to day.

#### A HOUSE OF CORRECTION.

The bill now before the General Assembly to establish a house of refuge and industrial school for Charleston, has received a favor able report, and seems likely to pass. It empowers the City Council to establish a house of refuge and industrial school for destitute orphans and juvenile offenders of all kinds. The institution will be managed by a board of commissioners appointed by Council. The Mayor will have the power of commitment, and the children committed will be instructed in various useful arts, until they arrive at the age of fourteen years, when the board of commissioners will bind them out as apprentices, the females until eighteen years old, and the males until twenty one. The bill also makes it a misdemeaner for any person to entice away or har bor an inmate of the institution.

OGITON. NAVAL STORES AND PHOS-PHATES FOR GREAT BRITAIN.

The fine iron British barg Magnet, Captain Brown, was cleared by Messrs. Gibbes & Barnwell, yesterday, for Liverpool, with 1950 bales upland cotton weighing 877,644 pounds, vaiue \$163,916; 150 tons phosphate weighing 336,000 pounds, value \$1050; 1 tierce rice, 362 pounds, value \$25. In short, the Branchville restaurant is a model worthy of imitation, and forms an agreeable exception to a very disagreeable role.
