### NEWS OF THE DAY.

-Hon. Horatic Seymour is going to Florida. -Out of the three hundred and seventynine students of Princeton College one hundred and seventy have recently become converted and joined the church.

-On the 20th of December 2 vessel named the Gleassannox arrived at Honolulu on a voyage from Macao, China, to Punta Arenas, Central America, with six hundred and eighty-five Chinamen on board, who had been entered on the ship's manifest as personal effects, all to be taken to Punta Arenas. The discipline on board was that of the old-time slavers which sailed from the coast of Africa.

-It is proposed to tunnel the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers near their Junction, in order to facilitate railroad movements. A company for that purpose has been formed, with a capital of \$10,000,000, and has applied to Congress for an act of incorporation. Among the capitalists who have lent the scheme their support are Thomas Scott (of course) and J. N. McCallagh, of Pennsylvania, J. Pierpont Morgan, of New York, General Burnside, W. B. Curtin and W. F. Coolbaugh, of Illinois.

\_It appears that England has just been visited with an extraordinary visitation of cold weather, causing not only great distress, but hundreds of deaths. Weather so unnatural in England found many of the poor unprovided with sufficient comfort and pro tection, and hence the widely extended suffering and many fatalities. It has been but a day or two since one of the flercest storms of the year strewed the British coast with wrecks. Truly has this been a calamitous winter on both sides of the Atlantic.

-A tew days since a batch of some forty or fifty youthful Chinese women arrived at San Francisco, from China, In the steamer Colorado. The news spread like wild-fire among the youthful male Chinamen in the Chines quarter, and, attired in their best clothes, they flocked to the wharf to witness the exhilarating spectacle of the landing of the Chinese damsels. After the customhouse irspectors had examined the new arrivals, the fattering bevy were transferred in express wagons to Jackson street, where they were to be sold to those desiring a wife. The prospect of getting wives was what caused the agitation among the Chinese young men on the occasion, and doubtless they have all been

happily suited ere this. --An importation of five hundred thousand salmon eggs from the River Rhine is expected daily in New York. Two hundred and fifty thousand were purchased by the United States Government at ferty dollars a thousand. The other quarter of a million is a present to the United States from the Government of Germany. Upon their arrival in New York they will be conveyed to the hatching houses on the Hudson and similar places on the Connecticut River. Dr. Slack, the fish commissioner of New Jersey, has several thousand young salmon from the Sacramento Biver, California, which are to be placed in the Susquehanna. The steamer with the German importation left Bramen on the 15th of January, and is now due.

-Emigration to Samana has commenced. The steamer Tybee has left New York for the new wonderland, treighted with fortunehunters, great expectations, and a generally miscelfaneous cargo. A hotel has been shipped in sections, with three carpenters to erect it, and in a few days after arrival the Hotel de Grant or Baez will loom up as the first triumphal column in the march of a new civilization. Men ambitions of speedy distinction, whose prophetic minds bave said they were to be governors, collectors, or captains of hundreds, have taken passage, while a committee of the company's own selection accompany the expedition to study the topography of Samana, select a site for the city of the future, oversee the first building operations, and superintend the corps of surveyors in the arrangement of docks, wharves, warehouses.

A large number of citizens of Buffalo made the application for a commutation of the sentence, animated by sympathy for the young family of the condemned. Professor Tyndall in the course of his speech referred to the importance of the cultivation in this country of science, in its highest forms, and said that the prime essentials for the promotion of this object were not so much buildings as brains; the making use, as far as possible, of existing institutions, and letting chairs be founded, sufficiently but not luxuriously endowed, which shall have original research for their main object and ambition. With such vital centres all establishments of education would feel their influence; with such centres even primary instruction will ever flourish as it ought. He would not, as a general rule, wholly sever tultion from investigation, but the one ought to be made subservient to the

#### Promise and Performance.

The greatest boon that the Legislature can possibly confer upon the State, just now, is to adjourn. The party pledges of retrenchment and reform were very fine things in their way; but the people want something more substantial than pledges. If our legislators desire to prove that they are in earnest in their solemn promises to economize, let them at once stop talking, finish their work and go home.

Germany Ready;

Whatever may be the result of the various complications that now threaten the peace of Europe, it is very evident that Germany does not mean to be caught napping. The cable has just informed us that the reorganization of her army-already the most effective in the world—has been begun, and tiring as if the French eagles were to-day clety novel worthy of her high reputation. pressing forward to vengeance and the Rhine. The work of fortifying the Western frontier is rapidly approaching completion. Strasbourg, on the French side at least, is finished. Metz is still in progress. Mainz is to be converted into an enceinte of outlying forts like Strasbourg. The ground of the old walls has been sold to the city corporation, to be converted into streets, promenades, and building lots. Cologne is to undergo the same process, and Wesel is to be fortified. It is computed that the quadrilateral formed by Metz, Thionville, Strasbourg, Coblenz, Mainz and Rastadt will, in case of invasion, weaken the French by 300,000 men. The cost of these fortification extensions, of the new military roads to the Rhine. of rearming the infantry and increasing the artillery, is estimated at 250,000,000 thalers and upward. But Germany means to get ready, and keep ready, cost what it may. She can very well spare some of the French gold she has won to strengthen her position.

### The Detection of Crime.

The London Times fancies that the old fallacy that "murder will out" must be pretty nearly exploded by this time. It traces the origin of the belief to an age when superstition was made to do the work of the modern detective-when, if the proofs of his guilt were not directly brought home to the murderer, the confronting of the population of the neighborhood with the victim, in the church, and the ordeal by touch, made somebody responsible for his crime. It admits that this was a wild kind of retribution, that innocent persons occasionally suffered for society, but admits that society was thus spared many atrocities. and many intended crimes were prevented. Now-a-days, on the contrary, if a man's brain is clear and his nerves are strong enough to plan a crime, the fear of detection need not trouble him much. Of course there will always be some risk of being found out and punished, but the question in any case is narrowed down to the point whether the end is worth the means of attaining it. Prudence will keep a person from murder where the relations of the parties are notoriously such as to excite suspicion, but in other cases the chances of escape are encouraging. These remarks of the "leading journal" are suggested by the many cases of undetected murder that have occurred in London in which the criminal and his victim seem to have been previously unacquainted. But we are apt to expect better things of the systems in the great European capitals, and our expectations are not usually disappointed. In fact, considering the amount of crime the London police are called upon to deal with, it is not surprising that they should be occasionally misled. The fact that there are some exceptions to the rule that murder will out do not invalidate, but rather prove, it. It is natural enough to find the London press criticising the inefficiency of their police, because it certainly does not compare with that of Paris, though it is far more effective than our own; yet it is rather refreshing to have the London Times suggest that the library of Scotland Yard should be reinforced by the works of Edgar A. Poe, and of his French follower, Emile Geboriau, in order that detectives may profit by their

#### Hope for Louisiana.

There is a gleam of light in the Louislana political chaos. It is thought that enough candidates for the Legislature to form a constitutional quorum have received the endorsement of both Returning Boards. It this is the fact, a solution of the difficulty is possible. The organization of such a quorum of the State Legislature would give a certain nucleus around which a State Government worthy the name might form.

#### Texas Redeemed.

.The new Texas Legislature, the first really representative body that has met in the State for six years, assembled on the 14th ultimo and organized easily by electing M. D. K Taylor speaker of the House. There is a Democratic majority in both houses, and the Radicals no longer have their own way. The meeting of a Legislature of their own choice has had a happy effect on the people; universal good feeling prevails throughout the State, and the Radical Governor, Davis, is learning the habit of confining himself to the laws.

#### Education in Kentucky.

A bill before the Kentucky Legislature pro vides for a system of common schools for the education of colored youth, these institutions to be distinct from the white schools, and supported by a fund accruing through a tax of fifteen cents on every hundred dollars' worth of property owned by persons of African descent, half of the proceeds of any distribution of lands by Congress, and all donations or grants that may be made to the
