Court of General Sessions.

The only business done in the court was the arraignment of Samuel Galliard, colored, on charge of murder and the fixing of his trial for Wednesday next.

Solicitor Buttz, on Thursday, stated during the session of the court that Coroner Logan had improperly bound over the jury of inquest in the case of Wm. Davis to appear as witnesses against Rufus Conyers, the perpetrator of the homicide.

Yesterday the judge explained to the jurors that the solicitor had mistaken the recognizances of the jury to hold a second sitting for recognizances to appear as witnesses, and that, therefore, the coroner was entirely blameless.

The court then adjourned until Monday, when L. I. Woolf will be tried for the murder of H. L. Perrin. Solicitor Buttz having previously to his election as solicitor been engaged as Woolf's counsel, he requested the attorney-general to designate some other lawyer to conduct the prosecution. The attorney-general accordingly appointed Mr. W. H. Brawley, solicitor of the Fifth Circuit, who arrived in this city on Thursday. The defense will be conducted by Major G. L. Bulst and Colonel T. Y. Simons.

THE DELEGATION TO AUGUSTA.

The Chamber of Commerce delegation to the Agricultural Convention, which meets at Augusta on next Tuesday, assembled yesterday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce Rooms. The Hon. George A. Trenholm, chairman of the committee, stated that the South Carolina Railroad Company had volunteered to transport the delegates to Augusta and back free of cost, and would attach a private car for their accommodation to the express train which leaves this city for Augusta at half-past eight o'clock on Monday evening next. The delegates are requested to meet each other in the car.

Exports.

Liverpool.—Per Brk Onward—35 sea island cotton, 100 bales upland cotton, 200 tons phosphate rock.

The Charleston Cotton, Rice and Naval Stores Market.

FRIDAY EVENING, February 7, 1913. COTTON.—There was rather a good inquiry for this staple, mainly for middling grades, which quality was about 1/4¢ higher, while the lower qualities were unchanged.
