It reveals a state of things perhaps little suspected by those who look on at a distance, and who, while informed of earnings in the gross, are proue to overlook the practical difficulties made for the administration by the ravages of war, the accumulation of interest, the impattence of creditors, and the necessity of settling some claims and arranging for time on others. It shows what has been done with the earnings of the road since the close of the war, and carries with it internal evidence of good judgment and wise forethough in the purposes to which they have been applied. Stockholders, who will consider the matter carefully, must conclude that their interests have been well cared for and managed with prudence. They cannot fail to perceive that payment of dividends, during the period covered by the statements and explanations of the letter, was simply impossible. Creditors had to be quieted, the debt kept down, and the value of shares protected.

The present condition of the affairs of the road is such as, in all probability, to justify a declaration of dividends for the year 1872. Its prospects of success in the future appear to be bright and encouraging. We trust that they may be realized. A PROSPEROUS RAILROAD.

Superintendent Dodamead Explains the Detention of Freights on the Greenville and Columbia Railroad-An Unexampled Increase of Freight We find in the Columbia Carolinian the fol-

lowing gratifying explanatory letter from Superintendent Dodamead, of the Greenville and Columbia Railroad :

I notice you state in your paper of to-day that "serious complaints are made to you by merchants on the line of the Greenville Railroad of the intolerable detention of freights." road of the intolerable detention of freights."
While I do not perceive how making complaints to you can benefit them in getting their freights forward, yet I deem it proper, in Justice to this road and its officers, to say that while there has been considerable detention of freights at Columbia destined for points on the line of this road, it has been unavoidable, and arises from the great incress in the freight business of the road, unexpected and unexampled in its history, and totally beyond the capacity of its motive power and rolling stocks. On inquiry of the officers of this company, who will at all times cheerfully inraish information, those making these complaints would have been convinced that in many instances the most serious detention has been before the freights convinced that in many instances the most serious detention has been before the freights have reached this road and from the same causes as operate on this road, a similar state of affairs being general throughout the country during the past winter, viz: an increase of ireights above the capacity of the railroad lines to move promptly. Only yesterday a gentleman exhibited at our office bills of ntleman exhibited at our office bi lading for some five car loads of freight dated lateon January, and early in February, two of which had just arrived, and were sent lorward promptly for him this morning. This company has had its own supplies of oils, &c., six weeks on the way from Cincinnati after date of bills of lading. Trains on this road have been kept moving day and night, double crews for the engines and trains employed, so as to keep them moving all the time, and every exertion used on the part of the officers to expedite transportation. The fact of what has been and is now doing on this read in this respect which had just arrived, and were sent forward transportation. We think that this plain statement of facts should satisfy all concerned that while it is to be regretted that delays as to the transportation of freight have occurred, it has been unavoidable, and not the result of want of energy and industry on the part of the officers of the various railroads, and at least not cers of the various railroads, and at least not of this one. There is no merchant on the line of the Greenville Railroad who has been engaged in business upon it for any consider-able length of time who is not cognizant of t and unexpected increase of the business over it, and if he has given himself the trouble to look into it, of the truth of all nerein stated as regards this road.

WARMING RAILWAY CARRIAGES.—A mode of more safely and more effectually warming railway carriages than by stove or hot water, it is said, has been widely adopted in Germay. The invention consists of the use of a composite fuel, which only smoulders slowly, and is encassed in an iron tray, enclosed in a copper box, hermetically closed. The heat is said to last for twenty-tour hours, if necessary. The fuel is called the "chascoal parquettes." At sixty-five dollars per ton, the cost is said to be almost nominal, and the apparatus costs only six dollars to each compartment.
