NEWS OF THE DAY.

-Professor Joseph Le Conte, in a paper i Sillimen's Journal, upholds the opinion tha the whole theory of geology must be recon structed on the basis of a solid earth.

-Late advices from Brazil report that the cotton crop in that country has suffered serious injury, and that the deficiency will be much larger than had been anticipated. The ship ments are already almost at an end, and bu trifles are still expected from the interior. -The burnt district in Boston now present

an exceedingly animated appearance. The work of rebuilding is progressing at a very rapid rate, and present indications are that before the snows of another winter fall little will be left to mark the scene of the conflagra-

-Florida is destined to be the Arcadia for the sick and the invalids of the North. Its delightful winter climate, its fruit, game and there are no less than fifteen other States Ash, all conspire to make it attractive both to the sick and the pleasure seller. The number of visitors this year has been unprecedented, and many have concluded to buy property and make it a winter home in the future.

-Illinois workmen still enjoy the privilege of working or not, as they please, but a new law just signed by the governor renders it a very serious matter for them to interfere with others in the exercise of the same privileges. Persons convicted of attempting either individually or in combination to coerce either workmen or employers are liable to a fine of \$500 or six months' imprisonment.

-It is announced that the Petit Journal of Paris, which probably has really "the largest lation in the world," has passed into the hands of that most enterprising of French newspaper men, M. Emile de Girardio, in conjunction with M. Gilbrat of Le Constitutionnel and M. Jenty of La France. It is further stated that M. de Girardin has sold La Liberté to his nephew, M. Detroyal, but probaly at the same time retaining considerable influence over it. The circulation of the Petit Journal is over 200,000 a day. Its price is a sou. It has a large clientéle in London also. M. de Girardin is now nearly seventy. -The London money market, according to

the last mail advice, was beginning to be influenced by the prospect of new foreign loans It is understood that a large operation on account of the Russian Government is in contemplation, and Egypt and Turkey will also appear as borrowers before long. Advices from Brussels report the Issue of a three per cent. loan for 240,000,000 francs, intended partly for the purchase of the Great Luxemburg Ballway, and partly to assist to the conversion of the existing debt. Subscriptions have been invited for Massachusetts bonds for \$800,000 at five per cent. interest.

-It is not common for a clergyman to die in his pulpit, but this happened a Sunday or two since to the Rev. T. B. Hudson, pastor of the M. E. Cauron in Ciyde. He had read about fifteen minutes in a firm and distinct voice, when suddenly he stopped, requested that the windows be let down to admit the fresh air, pressed his hands to his forehead and leaned forward on the deak. Then, as if rallying all his strength for the effort, he began again, and uttered the words, "These days are passing away," and, as the last syllable left his lips, he fell back on the sofa and expired. Mr. Hudson had been for a period of thirty-three years in the active work of the ministry, and was widely known throughout central and western New York. ...

-An important discussion recently took place in the New Dominion Parliament relative to the best and most direct route between Canada and Europe. It was explained that St. John, the most easterly point is America, and Valencia, the most westerly of Europe, were divided by only about sixteen hundred miles or one hundred hours, whilst about forty more would, by railroad over Newtoundland, by steamer across the Gulf of St. Law rence to Shippigan, Canada, and thence by the International Railroad, bring mails or passengers to Quebec. The construction of this link of railroad was advocated on the ground that it would enable merchants to cross to Europe, transact their business, and return in a period of time now scarcely sufficient for the outward and return trips. It was also stated that this route would be shorter and preferable even for New York and Boston merchants. The prime minister of the New Dominion government warmly endorses the project, and promises to give the subject his best consideration, and if the scheme appeared practicable, it would obtain the sup-

port of his government. -The feast of Courban-Balram, which was recently celebrated in Turkey, left no room for business in any quarter during the four days festival: The least is one of sacrifices, and forms an occasion on which every good Mussulman immolates one sheep at least with his own hands. The poor are dispensed from this plone practice, and find their advantage in the distributions of flesh, which at this period carving and turning shops, wool carding

ty is obligatory, and their position and fortune are reckoned by the number of sheep which they sacrifice, with a view to distribution among the poor. During the four or five days preceding the feast, Constantinople is one huge sheep fold. On every hand nothing Thursdays and Saturdays, one year, \$4; six is seen but flocks of sheep, crowding the streets and public squares, where the peaceable animals are offered for sale. The richest private individual and the loftiest functionary of the State does not think it beneath him to come in person to this kind of fair and plunge his hand into the tuited hair of the animal he has already chosen by the eye to make himself certain that it is perfectly fat. The procession to the Mosque this year is said to have been immense, almost all the people bringing their sacrifices and wearing costumes of the most blzarre description. Nothing in the way of business is transacted during the feast, and gratified.

South Carolina Manufactures.

We have received from our Washington correspondent some interesting statistics of the mechanical and manufacturing industries of this State, which have been gathered from advance sheets of the United States Census Report, on the subject of manufactures, and which furnish a gratifying exhibit of the number and extent of these ladustries. The following table gives a concise statement of the principal statistics in each county, and in the State; showing the number of manfacturing establishments and of capital invested, the amount annually paid out in wages, and the value of the manufactured articles annually produced:

This is a most gratifying exhibit of the growth and development of manufacturing enterprises in South Carolina; and with this record of what has already been accomplished, and with the evident increase of interest on the part of the press and the people of the State in this important source of prosperity and stability, there is every reason to expect a still more rapid growth during the next few years, and an elevation of South Carolina in the census returns of 1880 to a still higher position in the scale of comparative manufacturing statistics.

Martin Farquhar Tupper.

Martin F. Tupper (the author of Proverbial Philosophy) has been reading with great success, in different parts of England, selections from his poetic works. The Sydenham Gazette proclaims that the number of editions through which Mr. Tupper's writings has passed, both in England and America, as well as on the Continent, was unprecedented in the experience of any living poet.

Capital Punishment.

Among the various pulpit discourses in New York on Sunday on the subject of the execution of Foster were those of Mr. Beecher and one or two others, who "improved the occa-"sion" by declaring themselves opposed to capital punishment. At a time when the exercise of the right and duty of society to protect itself was never more necessary than it hands employed therein; the amount of now is in New York, the sensational preachers harangue in favor of a relaxation of the legal penalties of crime. It seems a gross perversion of the influence of the pulpit when the only moral it can draw from the execution of a murderer is that the penalty of a life for a life is too severe. If the pulpit must discuss such matters, it should enforce the laws of God and man, both as to crime and its penalty, not weaken their canction. It might be expected that on such occasions the attention of the congregation would be drawn to the solemn command, "Thou shall not kill," and to its frequent and fearful violations, and that some sympathy should be shown with the murdered as well as the murderers. The tide of lawlessness will not be diminished in New York so long as leading clergymen preach funeral sermons over executed murderers, designed to show that they have been harship dealt with, while not a word is said of the hard fate of their victims nor of the horrible iniquity of their crimes.
