NEW ORLEANS, August 13.—The following order was issued to-day: HEADQUARTERS 3D MIL. DIST. GEORGIA, ALABAMA AND FLA.

I. The Commanding General has become satisfied that the civil officers in this Military District are only observing his order prohibiting them from using any influence to deter the people from reconstructing the State Governments...

II. Such use of the patronage of their offices is simply an evasion, perhaps unintentional, of the provisions of the General Orders above referred to, and is, in fact, an employment of the machinery of the provisional State Governments to defeat the execution of the reconstruction Acts.

III. It is therefore ordered, that all advertisements, or other official publications, heretofore or to be hereafter provided for by State and municipal laws or ordinances, be given, by the proper civil officers whose duty it is to cause such publication to be made, to such newspapers, and such only, as have not opposed and do not oppose reconstruction under the Acts of Congress...

His Honor the Mayor stated that he had called a meeting of the Council to present the following communication:

HEADQUARTERS MIL. POST COLUMBIA, COLUMBIA, S. C., August 12, '67. Hon. Theo. Stark, Mayor of Columbia. SIR: The license of J. S. McIntosh, as an inn or tavern-keeper, is referred to the City Council for reconsideration, said McIntosh having been arrested and tried by a competent tribunal for having sold intoxicating liquors to soldiers of this command, in violation of existing orders.

Your Honor is requested to call a special meeting of the City Council, for the reconsideration of all the licenses granted since July 1, 1867, as the number granted to inn or tavern-keepers appears to be much larger than the wants of the community require.

On motion, the above communication was received as information. Alderman Fisher offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That the information furnished the City Council through Gen. Burton's communication, of the 12th instant, was unknown to the Council in the case of J. S. McIntosh.
