

# TELEGRAPHIC

Foreign News.

**London, June 19.**—The Lords, at 8 o'clock this morning, passed the disestablishment bill to a second reading. In the Commons, a motion was made to go into committee on the new operative commercial treaty with France, the present treaty expiring before the next session. Bright opposed the proposition in a strong speech. The House decided the matter by a vote of 101 against and 155 in favor.

The Prince of Wales and Duke of Cambridge were present during the entire proceedings last night in the Lords.

Lassara, the Spanish envoy to England, has resigned.

**Paris, June 19.**—A crowd of people followed the funeral of the rioters killed at the recent tumultuous demonstration. There was no disorder.

Eight hundred of the rioters recently arrested were discharged and two hundred held.

**Madrid, June 19.**—Serrano took the regency oath, loud rivas following. The Cabinet is as follows: Prim, War and President; Solvela, State; Herrera Grace and Justice.

## Washington News.

**Washington, June 19.**—The Bricklayers Association have expelled six members, for working with colored bricklayers at the Navy Yard.

Internal revenue receipts to-day, nearly a million dollars.

Treasury messengers, heretofore dignified personages, heretofore are to scrub and sweep.

The revenue officials report the seizure of sixty illicit stills in the mountains of Virginia, Tennessee and North Carolina.

It is stated that on Grant's return, the Cabinet will consider and adopt a positive policy regarding Cuba. Secretary Fish disavows any agency, direct or indirect, in the recent proceedings against the Cuban.

The Herald says the President, it is understood, favors granting belligerent rights to the Cubans, but the Cabinet is against him. Secretary Fish strongly sympathizes with the Cubans, as does also Secretary Bore; but Attorney-General Hoar and Secretary Boutwell are pronounced against them.

Ullman's distillery, in Baltimore, was seized to-day.

The partisans of Delano demand the assistance of the marines, to suppress illicit distillation in the suburbs of Philadelphia. The people drive off the revenue officers with stones.

The steamer Crikot, plying between Key West and Havana, was wrecked to-day.

## Domestic News.

**CHARLESTON, June 19.**—Sailed—steamship Jas. Adger, New York; schr. B. N. Hawkins, Providence, R. I.

**WILMINGTON, N. C., June 19.**—The steamship Mary Sandford is ashore at the mouth of the Cape Fear river, in a leaking condition. A tug has gone to her assistance, with steam pumps.

**MONTGOMERY, ALA., June 19.**—The Democratic Convention at Dadesville, for the Third District, nominated J. C. Parkinson for Congress. He is a Northern man by birth, who settled in Aiken, in 1865, and has invested largely in the State. The nomination was quite unexpected to him, as he has devoted his time to manufacturing and farming, and was not known as a politician.

**Boston, June 19.**—The Custom House authorities say the clearance of the steamer Delphine, on Thursday night, was in strict conformity with law. Her warlike character is unquestioned, but her destination is known only to parties who control her.

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.**—The Colorado for Panama, took \$75,000, 1,200 Chinese arrived yesterday, by sailing vessels. The rust has appeared in wheat and barley.

## Affairs in Virginia.

**RICHMOND, June 19.**—The Convention at Staunton adjourned sine die, last night, after a resolution of thanks to the citizens, heads of public institutions and railroads, for courtesies. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad will be completed to Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs, next Wednesday.

The valley of Virginia will yield five millions bushels of wheat this season.

The alleged Cuban recruiting officer was released to-day, by the United States Commissioner—no evidence against him.

No change will be made in the Conservative Legislative tickets, on account of Gen. Canby's opinion that the test oath must be taken by members of the Legislature.
