

WHY NOT UNITE? The new departure was tried by the Democrats in Maine, California, Connecticut and Nebraska, and failed. Ohio and Pennsylvania have just spoken, and according to telegraphic accounts from those States, the Democrats, bearing aloft the banner of the "Departure," have been crushed beneath the heel of Radical despotism.

The New York Democrats have adopted a wiser, and, we think, better course. They have adopted a platform which leaves the questions in issue between the "departurists" and their opponents in the balance, while they seize upon the strategic points which command the Radical camp. They make a truthful and terrible onslaught upon the corruption of the party in power, and denounce the bold and flagrant infractions of the Constitution which have been committed by the Radicals. Acknowledging in general terms, as the legitimate results of the war, the emancipation of the Southern slaves and the establishment of their civil rights before the law, they press boldly on against the enemy, without pausing to discuss among themselves the rightfulness or the unrightfulness of the methods by which these results have been accomplished. Their first aim is to defeat those in power—to secure the Government from the hands of those who are now seeking to destroy it—and in this noble work they have no time to look behind and ascertain, with mathematical certainty the particular process by which the character of the Government has been changed, and the people deprived of their liberty.

The first great point which should engage the Democracy everywhere should be to secure success—not a success procured either by the acceptance of wrong principles nor by the surrender of right principles. The Rochester platform affords a common ground upon which all honest opponents of Radical misrule may safely come together for the defeat of the common enemy. Those holding new departure opinions, and those opposed to the departure, may safely rest upon that platform, because neither the policy of the one or the principle of the other are opposed or compromised in the least degree by the declaration contained in the second resolution of that platform. Why not, then, let all shades of Democratic opinion, all lovers of constitutional government, and all friends of the constitution, take position on the Rochester platform, and cordially unite in joint efforts to destroy the monster Radicalism.
