CITY OF COLUMBIA,  
secured by a Sinking Fund. Coupons secured by an Annual Tax levied on the City Taxes. Bonds non-taxable by the City. Bond Debt of the City Limited by Law to \$800,000. Taxable Property of the City \$7,000,000.

THE BONDS offered are authorized by an Act of Assembly approved March 18, 1872, for the construction of the new City Hall. Their final redemption is, by the terms of said Act, secured by a "sinking fund," to be accumulated from the annual rents of the building. These rents will reach by 1880 to \$10,000 per annum; and the Carolina National Bank holds a lien of the building for a term of twenty years, as trustee, with power to collect the rents and hold the same invested as a fund for the redemption of the bonds.

By said Act an special annual tax is required to be levied to pay the semi-annual coupons, and the Carolina National Bank is made the trustee of the city to receive the taxes when collected and to pay the coupons. The coupons are also receivable for city taxes.

The taxable property of the city is at present assessed at \$7,000,000; and by said Act the bond debt of the city cannot be increased beyond \$800,000, while the bonds are outstanding. The bonds are exempt by law from city taxation.

These bonds are offered to the public at eighty not, with interest from date of purchase to January 1, 1873, allowed in settlement. After that date, the accrued interest to be added.

To citizens of Columbia these bonds will give an income of 12 1/2 per cent., as may be seen from the following statement:
