STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.
WHEREAS a vacancy now exists in the Office of Coroner for the County of Orangeburg;
Now, know ye that I, FRANKLIN J. MOSES, Jr., Governor of the State of South Carolina, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by an Act of the General Assembly of said State, entitled "An Act concerning the office, duties and liabilities of Coroner," approved January 27, 1870, do hereby appoint and constitute P. HAYS, a Trial Justice of said County, a Coroner of said County of Orangeburg, to fill said vacancy, and to perform the duties of said office until the Legislature shall order an election to fill said vacancy.
In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be hereunto affixed at Columbia, this 1st day of April, 1879, and in the ninety-ninth year of the independence of the United States of America.
