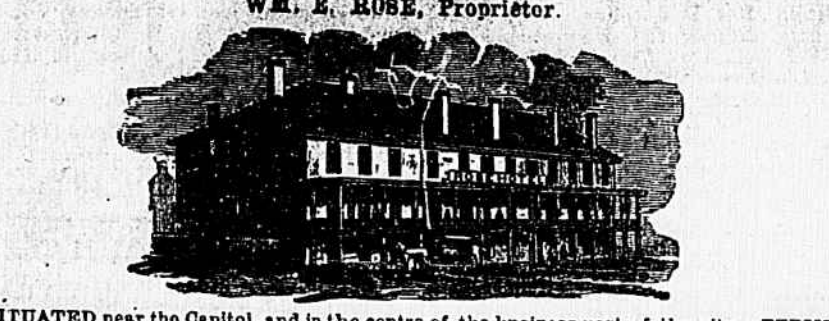

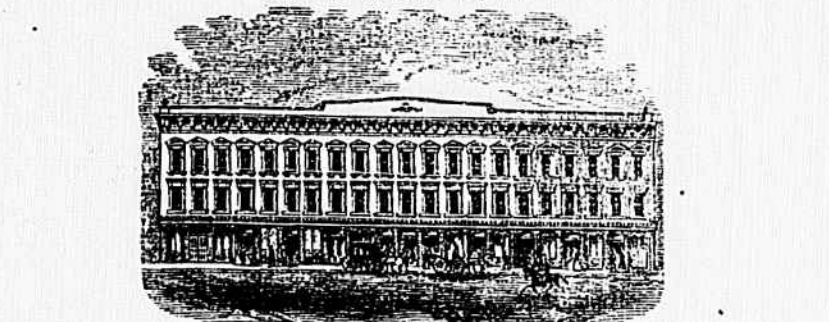

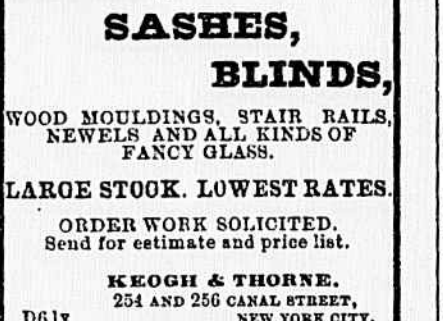

## NOTICE. COUNCIL CHAMBER, COLUMBIA, S. C., March 21, 1878.

THE attention of the citizens of Columbia is called to the following extract from a city ordinance in relation to shade trees. No one has a right to destroy, or in any way to mutilate the shade trees in the city, and any infringement of the ordinance in relation thereto will be punished by fine, as provided by law: "SECTION 15. Be it further ordained, That if any person shall cut down, kill or wilfully damage any tree, natural or transplanted, growing in the streets of Columbia, or shall wilfully destroy, injure or remove any post, railing or box, used or erected for protecting such trees or the sidewalks, such person shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding forty-five dollars for each and every offence."
