Gen. Grant's Indian peace policy has brought disgrace and disaster upon the national arms. Many valuable lives have been lost by temporizing with the Modocs, who are still victorious and defiant. The Administration sustains the usurping and fraudulent Government of Kellogg, while Captain Jack and his Modocs slaughter the soldiers among the lava beds. Mr. Croe, Secretary of the Peace Commission, says that a year ago, the Modocs numbered 253 souls, men, women and children. He estimates the fighting men at about seventy. The New York Herald's correspondent states the number of Modocs now in the field as only thirty.

Field Marshal Wrangel, of the Prussian army, is said to be the oldest soldier in the world on the active list, having been commissioned a Lieutenant in 1798.
