The Marion Street Celebration. Last Sunday, June 29, 1873, was a high-day with the members of Marion Street church of this city. As previously announced, they celebrated on that day their twenty-fifth anniversary. The Washington Street congregation very properly closed their church both morning and afternoon, and united with their "up-town" brethren in their quarterly celebration.

With commendable good taste, the brethren did not attempt any extensive decoration of the church. A simple arch, with evergreen borders, bearing the inscription, "What hath God wrought," was attached to the wall in the rear of the pulpit. At the base of the arch, upon the one side, was attached a card, dressed in the same way, upon which was inscribed "1848," while opposite was a similar one, with "1873" printed thereupon. Just beneath these dates, imitation slabs, also dressed with evergreens, were fastened, inscribed respectively, "In Memory of our Deceased Pastors," and "In Memory of our Deceased Members." Upon the face of each slab was fastened a bow of crapo and a sprig of evergreen emblems of death and life, of sorrow and of hope.

At 10 o'clock a. m., Rev. A. M. Christy, of the S. C. Conference, preached an able sermon on a much-neglected subject to an over-crowded house. At the close of the sermon, the pastor, Rev. W. D. Kirkland, read a sketch of the history of the church, and made an appeal for funds to build a parsonage and repair the church. A collection was then taken up, which, in cash and subscription, amounted to about \$1,400, which was swelled by the collection at night to the handsome sum of about \$1,700. This will insure the success of the scheme, though they lack some \$800 of having the required amount.

At 5 o'clock p. m., memorial services were held. Remarks were made by several, and letters were read from quite a number of the former pastors. Only three or four persons at hand had been present at the dedication by Bishop Capers, twenty-five years ago. One of these was the venerable and much-loved father Derrick, who now worships regularly with this congregation. The exercises of this hour were of special interest and profit. It is to be regretted that all of the former pastors of the church could not be present to participate personally in these interesting services.

At 8 o'clock p. m., Rev. S. B. Jones preached a forcible sermon to a large and appreciative congregation, thus bringing to a happy and fitting close the exercises of the day. The Marion Street congregation will not soon forget the 29th of June! All of the services were unusually pleasant, interesting and profitable. We all felt that it was good to be there, and rejoiced that we had been spared to see the day and enjoy its privileges.

Why Cut Down the Weeds?—Is it not a mistake of the Board of Health that they recommend the cutting down of the weeds, &c., on the vacant lots in the city? Instead of growing weeds and other such vegetation being hurtful, the exact opposite seems to us to be true. They feed, while growing, on any neighboring malaria, and emit instead a healthful disinfecting influence to the atmosphere of their locality. To cut these weeds down, while green and growing, and leave them in piles in the lots or on the streets or on the sidewalks, is the very plan to convert these cheap and natural disinfectants into breeders of malaria. And this bad air, blending with the malaria from the ground which the weeds had covered while standing, will surely throw, for a time, a greater quantity of malaria into the atmosphere. If, however, the Board is right in ordering the weeds to be cut down, we should like to learn the philosophy in the case.

THE PEACE REFORM.—The peace reform is fraught with infinite blessings to mankind, and the masses seem to regard it with the utmost indifference, as if it were a matter in which they had no kind of interest.

In time of war, the public mind is so absorbed with the exciting scenes connected with battles, sieges, marches, and the issues of war generally, that there is little chance of getting any serious hold on the public mind. Men are ready to say, the present is no time to talk of peace; wait until the war is over and then talk about such subjects; and when the war is over men are ready to turn their thoughts to other subjects, to the utter neglect of this.—Messenger of Peace.
