LIQUID GLUE.—An excellent liquid glue can be made.by dissolving glue in nitric ether. This ether only takes up a certain quantity of glue, so that there is no danger of the solution being too concentrated. The glue obtained in this way can be made to have the con-sistency of molasses, and its tenaoity is said to be twice that of glue dissolved in hot water. A few pieces of India rubber about the size of a bullet put into the glue and well shaken will dis-eolve in a few days, and add to the ad-hesiveness of the preparation, as well as protect it from the action of the mois-ture. ture.






