THE PUBLIC DEST.—The decrease in the public debt during September is just offset by the awards of the Mixed Commission: to: British subjects for damages to their persons and property during the rebellion, the decrease in the debt being \$1,901,467, and the awards of the Commission amounting to \$1,-929,286. The adecrease in the debt from the 1st of March, 1873, to the 1st of October, 1873, is very much smaller than it was during the corresponding period in 1872, though the receipts of the Government have shown no dimi-nutions, and there has been no cause for increased expenditures. This shows that the forced economy of last year has given place to wanton extravegance.


