

CONSIDERATION OF THE PROLONGATION OF
MACHAHON'S POWERS—THE CARLIST
VICTORY AT MYTH—FRENCH EXCITEMENT
SPRINGFIELD—PRUSSIAN DEBATES, &c., &c.
PARIS, November 8.—The three bu-
reaux of the Assembly, which deferred
naming their members of the committee
on the prolongation of President Mac-
Mahon's powers until to-day, re-assem-
bled this morning, and elected Count de
Remasat, M. Leoussay and M. Labou-
laye candidates of the Left. This gives
the Republicans a majority of one in the
committee. The result has given rise
to the most intense excitement. It is
said that the Right, which, on the open-
ing of the Assembly on Wednesday last,
submitted a motion prolonging Marshal
MacMahon's powers for ten years, has
formed, as a compromise, to make the term
five years. M. Leoussay, at the re-
quest of the Government, has consented
to a postponement of the debate on his
interpellation for failure to order elec-
tions to fill vacancies in the Assembly.

PARIS, November 10.—A committee,
representing the French residents of
San Francisco, called upon Thiers yester-
day, and presented an address. The ex-
-President, in his remarks in reply,
told his visitors that the monarchists
had suffered a check, and that the cor-
-servative republic was assured.

BERLIN, November 10.—Royal de-
-crees have been promulgated relieving
Von Roen of the Presidency of the
-Prussian Ministry, and appointing
Prince Bismarck in his place, and Herr
-Camphauser Vice-President.

LONDON, November 10.—The Carlists
continue to claim a great victory at
Miranda. They report that Moriones
was driven from the vicinity of Estella
to Loez Arizon. On the other hand,
General Moriones, in his official report
of the battle to the Spanish Govern-
-ment, states that he passed two nights
on the ground previously held by the
-enemy.

PARIS, November 10.—As anticipated,
the compromise offered by the Right
will be accepted, perhaps with some
-modifications. Both sides seem dis-
-posed to pursue a conciliatory course.
The excitement here and at Versailles
is subsiding, and it is believed the crisis
is over.

LONDON, November 10.—The steam-
-ship City of Richmond was spoken Nov-
-ember 4, with engines broken; all well.

MADRID, November 10.—The report
that the Carlists were victorious in an
-engagement near Miranda De Arga, and
-that Lieutenant-General Primo De
-Rivera was killed, is officially denied
this morning. Gen. Primo De Rivera
was not hurt, nor was Gen. Moriones
-captured by the insurgents. The Gov-
-ernment has received despatches from
-both those officers, dated the 3th.

CHARLESTON, November 10.—Arrived
-Steamship Georgia, New York.

NEW ORLEANS, November 6.—The
-cigar-makers, who are on a strike, pa-
-raded the streets, to-night, headed by a
-brass band. The procession was very
-orderly, and numbered about 300. A
-large number of colored men carried
-torches and transparencies bearing ap-
-propriate mottoes.

Bertin and Carro, noted desperadoes
and burglars, who escaped from the
-parish prison, on the 1st instant, by
-throwing red pepper in the jailer's eyes,
-were recaptured, this evening, after a
-severe resistance, in which Bertin was
-shot, and it is believed, mortally
-wounded.

New York, November 8.—The bank-
-ruptcy case of Kanyon, Cox & Co. has
-been amicably settled. Drew was a
-member of the firm.

The strike of the brick-layers and la-
-borers continues, but without much suc-
-cess. There are a sufficient number of
-non-union men, who work at reduced
-rates, to meet the demands of builders.
-350 laborers were discharged, to-day,
-from the public works, owing to ap-
-propriations being exhausted. Others are
-to be discharged next week.

Gen. Quesada and several other promi-
-nent Cubans, it is said, will take im-
-mediate steps to hold a meeting in this
-city to express their indignation at the
-recent execution of their friends in Havana.
-It is also said that Gen. Agueroles will
-soon have in readiness 600 men to lead
-into action in Cuba.

The steamship City of Richmond,
-which a London despatch announces as
-over-due, is one of the largest vessels
-entering this port, and is one of the
-latest additions to the Inman fleet. She
-is remarkable alike for her great size
-and completeness of her external fittings.
-The agents of the Inman line in this
-city say that no anxiety need be felt
-concerning the safety of the vessel, as
-the delay in her arrival is probably due
-to some accident to her machinery.

WASHINGTON, November 9.—The
-jury in the Udderzook case returned a
-verdict of murder in the first degree.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 9.—J. W.
-Potter, a clerk in the post office and a
-cousin of Senator Sargent, and another
-clerk, named E. D. Herriok, have been
-arrested, charged with stealing from
-the office and opening letters for that
-purpose.

St. Louis, November 9.—W. R.
-Walker has been appointed receiver of
-the North Missouri Insurance Company.
-A reduction of twenty per cent. time,
-and ten per cent. in wages, is announced
-in the Sedalia and Missouri Railroad
-shops.

New York, November 9.—A mass
-meeting of Cubans was held to-day.
-Hilain Cessars presided. Patriotic ad-
-dresses were made, and a resolution
-adopted calling for means to furnish
-throughout a new expedition to the
-island. A committee was appointed to
-solicit subscriptions. The La Protectora
-Union subscribed \$2,000, and the

amount to \$800. The Cuban Junta in
-this city announces that all the means
-possible will be used to form an expedi-
-tion, to set out at once to Cuba to take
-revenge for the execution of the patri-
-ot seized on the Virginia. A corps is be-
-ing formed, composed of Americans
-alone, to proceed to Cuba. Already
-2,000 names have been put on the roll,
-many of them old and well-tried sol-
-diers. General Quesada is forming
-another expedition, and it is said 3,000
-names are enrolled. A majority are
-Cubans and exiles. The Cuban bureau
-is through nearly all the time.

The various charitable associations of
-Brooklyn and New York are actively
-preparing to meet the increased de-
-mands which will be made on their
-resources during the coming winter.

DETROIT, Mich., November 10.—The
-movement for a consolidation of the
-farmers' granges and labor reformers is
-quietly approaching consummation.

MEMPHIS, November 10.—The Chief
-of Police, thanking the police of other
-cities, announces further assistance nu-
-merous. Twenty-seven yellow fever
-deaths and thirty others during the past
-week. The city is free from infectious
-or contagious diseases. Three yellow
-fevers and three others on Sunday—old
-cases; one new case yesterday.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., November 10.—
-The printers on the Journal and Union
-struck, under a reduction of five cents
-per thousand. The papers appear as
-usual.

PORT WAYNE, November 10.—Kerr &
-Murray's foundry was burned to day;
-loss \$60,000. Many ousted.

LOUISVILLE, November 10.—Two of
-the men engaged in robbing the Col-
-umbia, Ky., bank and murdering the
-cashier, some time ago, have been
-caught in Maine, and will be brought to
-Kentucky for trial.

LOUISVILLE, November 10.—The
-wages of employees on the Louisville
-and Nashville Railroad will be reduced
-ten per cent. after the 16th. The closing
-of various industries around the falls
-ousted 4,000. The plug tobacco fac-
-tories are reducing force and wages. Se-
-veral of the largest factories are about
-closing temporarily.

NEW YORK, November 10.—The
-schooner Southerner, from Boston for
-Philadelphia, with ice, was wrecked off
-the Jersey coast. Capt. Thatcher and
-Seaman Miller were drowned.

Wm. Neyle, of Staten Island, com-
-mitted suicide in a Green-street bagnio,
-on Saturday night. He was formerly of
-South Carolina, and lost a fortune by
-the war.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., November 10.—
-The old round house of the Boston and
-Albany Railroad, with fifteen loco-
-motives, six extra tenders and two
-snow plows, was burned this morning.

QUEBEC, November 10.—The settlers
-on the island of Anticosta are repre-
-sented to be in a starving condition, and
-a Government steamer has been de-
-spatched with a large quantity of sup-
-plies and provisions for their relief.

KEY WEST, Fla., November 10.—A
-letter from Havana, dated November 5,
-gives the following account of the ex-
-ecution of the Virginian prisoners, at
-Santiago, on the 4th: The prisoners
-were shot at the place made famous by
-previous executions, and in the usual
-manner—kneeling close to the slaughter
-house wall. All marched to the spot
-with firmness. Behmetta and Ryan
-showed both marked courage, al-
-though the former was slightly affected
-toward the last. The two others quite
-broke down before they were bandaged,
-but Ryan kept up to the last, never
-flinched a moment, and died without
-fear or regret. Behmetta and Ryan
-were killed at the first discharge.

NEW YORK, November 10.—A failure
-in the tea trade is announced.
-35,000 tons of iron, consigned to the
-Northern Pacific Railroad, has been at-
-tached.

Nine jurors have been obtained on the
-Tweed case.

400 laborers were discharged from
-the department of public works to-day,
-and 200 more will be discharged Satur-
-day. The appropriations set aside for
-them are exhausted.

Greenleaf, Morris & Co. have notified
-the Stock Exchange that they are ready
-to pay in full.

The reported charges against ac-
-tivity Farley and others, in connection
-with the MacDonnell forgery case, have
-been abandoned by the counsel for the
-prosecution. The counsel for the Bank
-of England withdrew from the case to-
-day.

The suit of Gazaway Lamar, against
-Charles A. Dana, to recover damages for
-alleged illegal imprisonment of Lamar
-by Dana, when the latter was Assistant
-Secretary of War, which suit has been
-on the calendar of the United States
-Circuit Court for a long time, has been
-set down for trial before Judge Shipman
-to-morrow.

Both Rudolph and Royal Sammis, ar-
-rested on a charge of complicity in the
-murder of Kelsey, at Huntington, L. I.,
-were bailed by the Supreme Court of
-Brooklyn, to-day, in \$10,000 each. The
-bail was promptly furnished. They are
-charged with murder in the second de-
-gree.

MEMPHIS, November 10.—Two yel-
-low fever deaths to noon. Three new
-cases reported.

St. Louis, November 10.—James H.
-Lucas, the wealthiest citizen of St.
-Louis, died last night.

WASHINGTON, November 10.—Gen.
-Crosk, commanding the Department of
-Arizona, reports the slaughter of four-
-teen Tonton Indians during a recent
-excursion.

Probabilities—For the South Atlantic
-States, North-easterly and South-eas-
-terly winds, and generally clear weather.

Nothing of marked importance has
-occurred, to-day, with reference to the
-Virginian affair, with the exception of a
-despatch from Minister Sickles, notify-
-ing the Secretary of State that the
-Spanish Government had telegraphed

to the Government that the Virginian
-had been proceeded in the case of the
-captive now in custody. Minister
-Sickles was to have had an interview to-
-day with the Spanish Minister of For-
-eign Affairs, but whether it took place
-was not known at a late hour this eve-
-ning. The execution which recently oc-
-curred is condemned in official circles as
-brutal. When all the facts attending it
-become known, should it appear that in-
-ternational law has been violated, im-
-mediate measures will be taken to main-
-tain the dignity of this Government; but
-the Secretary of State has no idea the
-Castelar Government will be slow to
-make due reparation, as far as in its
-power, judging from the friendly dispo-
-sition towards the United States, and the
-expressed desire to cultivate more
-intimate relations of peace. The Secre-
-tary of State is represented as saying to-
-day, during an interview with reference
-to the reported execution of Santa Rosa,
-that he had not been officially advised
-of it; but that Santa Rosa had given a
-great deal of trouble. He was once be-
-fore condemned to death as a pirate. After
-consuming a ream of paper, and sending
-and receiving numerous cable despatches,
-this Government secured his release. Only
-a few weeks ago, Santa Rosa wrote to the
-Secretary, saying he owed the preservation
-of his life to him; therefore, the Secretary
-thought Santa Rosa was not wise in again
-peril his safety.

Among the depositors who, to-day,
-received thirty per cent. of their de-
-posits in the First National Bank, be-
-ing the first distribution of the assets of
-that institution, was ex-President John-
-son, who received nearly \$22,000 out of
-the \$73,000 he had on deposit there.

Telegraphic—Commercial Reports.
NEW YORK, November 8.—In the mar-
-ket for cotton on the spot, there has
-been no relief from the general depres-
-sion which has prevailed for some time
-past. The demand from the spinning
-interest has been limited, owing to the
-dullness of trade and financial difficul-
-ties, and their purchases have been ex-
-ceedingly limited. The receipts have
-been large, and, as a matter of course,
-have added greatly to the depression. Yesterday,
-there was a little better feeling
-in trade, occasioned by the upward
-tendency of the gold premium. The
-market closed steady, but it was not
-considered as a permanent improve-
-ment. In forward deliveries, dealings
-have been very liberal, but rates contin-
-ued to decline until yesterday, when
-the steadiness in spots caused a slight
-re-action, and rates closed with an ad-
-vance. The total sales for the week in-
-cluded 124,641 bales, of which 116,850
-bales were for future delivery and 7,791
-for immediate delivery, as follows: 3,208
-for export, 4,180 for spinning, 128 to
-speculators, and 175 in transit; included
-were 385 bales to arrive. Naval stores
-have experienced a heavy decline. To-
-bacco has not moderately declined, but
-business has been on a very limited
-scale, and mainly in small lots. Stocks,
-just before the close, rallied to the best
-figures of the day, but at the first lead-
-ing off yielded a fraction, though the
-market keeps strong. Erie is the weak
-spot, and being down 3 per cent. to
-37 1/2. Private advices from London,
-late in the day, were less favorable.
-Money was reported very active in the
-open market, at 9 per cent., and some
-firms had despatches from their London
-correspondents that the bank rate would
-be advanced to 10 per cent. next week,
-and that the Bank Act would be sus-
-pended.
