Meeting of Council.
Council met at 7:30 P. M. Present: His Honor the Mayor; Aldermen Carpenter, Thompson, Mitchell, Carroll, Carr, Griffin Cooper, Taylor, Lowndes and Young. Absent—Aldermen Hoge and Williams.

On motion of Alderman Carpenter, the reading of the minutes of the last regular (and special) meetings were dispensed with.

A communication from S. Sheridan, for a settlement on account of the police force, was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

A communication from D. W. Eidier, to purchase or lease a portion of the city property, embraced in Sidney Park, was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Application from the Enterprise Fire Engine Company, for the city to erect for them an engine house and hall, was, on motion of Alderman Cooper, referred as information.

The following bills were received and referred to the Committee on Accounts: Cooper & Taylor, S. W. Hook and John Alexander, water works; Cooper & Taylor, A. Richardson, J. O. Dial, W. Glaze, W. Steiglitz, Howie & Allen and J. A. Jackson, guard house; Ohas. Mahon, miscellaneous; Cooper & Taylor, Fagan & Bros., (two bills), indigent poor; W. Sloan, printing; Cooper & Taylor, W. Glaze, (two bills), L. Wilson; clerk's office; Hopson & Sutphen, miscellaneous; Howie & Allen, J. D. Starling & Co., hospital; J. O. Dial, W. D. Starling & Co., alms house; M. Williams, Cooper & Taylor, (two bills), B. F. Griffin, (two bills), Jackson Parker, John Alexander, J. O. Dial, (three bills), F. W. Wing, street department; S. D. Swygert, examination pauper lunatics.

A large number of applications for renewal of tavern license were received and referred to the Committee on License.

The report of the Chief of Police for the month of December was presented and referred to the Committee on Guard House.

Amount of fines collected, \$47.40.

The report of the Overseer of the Poor for the month of December was presented, and referred to the Committee on Alms House.

The report of the City Clerk and Treasurer was received, and, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Alderman Carpenter, from the Committee on Ways and Means, spoke on the subject of street lamps, which the committee had recommended at a former meeting, and also called the attention of the Council to one on exhibition in the hall, and thought the burner was one preferable to any light he had seen; it being a burner that generated its own gas from naphtha, and gave a light equal, if not superior, to the best coal gas, and as the matter of the kind of burners to be used in the lamps ordered by the city had not been determined, he asked of Council to take action; He also stated that the cost would be about \$9,200, with burners and all attachments, including lanterns and posts. He also asked of Council to hear from John D. Whilden, agent of the Globe Gas Light Company, of Boston, who was in the hall, and had the before mentioned light on exhibition.

Captain Whilden then made a statement as to the cost of naphtha in the burners offered by his company. Also, offered to attach his reservoirs and burners to the lanterns contracted for, and run 200 or more lights for five years, furnishing all material, oil, etc., for \$30 per lamp.

On motion of Alderman Carpenter, the whole matter was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Alderman Carpenter, from the Committee on Ways and Means, who were requested to furnish a statement of bonds sold and paid for to the city, made the following report: New bonds issued, \$250,000; total amount delivered and paid for, \$214,750; balance deposited in the banks of the city, \$35,250.

On motion of Alderman Carroll, the report of the committee was adopted and ordered to be published.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Carpenter and adopted: Resolved, That a standing committee of three members of the City Council be appointed by the Mayor, to be known as the Committee on Street Lamps and Gas Lights.

The Committee on Accounts reported favorably on the following bills, and recommended that the same be paid, which was adopted: John Alexander, Jackson Parker, B. F. Griffin, Street Department; John Alexander, Guard House; D. C. Peixoto & Sons, Cooper & Taylor, Street Department; T. J. Harper, Guard House; Dr. B. W. Taylor, (two bills), examination pauper lunatics; J. A. Jackson, Guard House.

Alderman Thompson, Chairman of the Committee on Alms House, reported that the contractor for the new alms house was ready to give the bonds and commence work, and asked of Council to fix the amount of the bond, the time for the work to be finished, and how the money should be paid.

Alderman Carroll stated that the fence around the city school-house needed repairs, and asked Council to take action.

On motion of Alderman Griffin, the committee were instructed to have the necessary repairs made.

The Committee on Guard House reported back the report of the Chief of Police for November as examined and found correct. Adopted.

Alderman Carroll offered an ordinance to amend an ordinance for regulating licenses for the year 1874, and to lower the same in some cases.

Alderman Cooper objected to the ordinance, as he thought it benefited only the rich man, and did not in any way benefit the poor man.

Alderman Lowndes objected to the same.

Alderman Young thought the license, in some cases, ought to be raised, instead of lowered.

Alderman Carpenter made a motion to strike out the enacting clause.

Alderman Carroll called for the yeas and nays, which resulted as follows: Those voting in the affirmative were—Aldermen Thompson, Lowndes, Taylor, Mitchell, Young, Griffin and Cooper. Those voting in the negative were—Aldermen Carroll and Carr.

Bids were then offered for furnishing the city with 250 lamp posts. The contract was, on motion of Alderman Taylor, awarded to Shiver & Mims, at one dollar per post; to be painted, two coats, and finished as per specification in advertisement, they being the lowest bidders.

Alderman Thompson, from the Committee on Alms House, recommended that the contractor for the new alms house give a bond for \$4,000, and the same be completed in five months, and asked of Council if they proposed to have an architect.

Alderman Young moved to amend the recommendation of the committee, by giving six months to complete instead of five months.

Alderman Cooper moved to adopt the recommendation of the committee, with the amendment offered by Alderman Young. Carried.

On motion, by Alderman Taylor, the Chief of Police was instructed to enforce the ordinance concerning wagons and other vehicles standing on the streets at night in front of shops or stores.

On motion, by Alderman Taylor, Council adjourned.
