

THE DEMOCRATIC VICTORY.—The New York Herald says editorially of the New Hampshire election:

A Democratic victory in this State is an unusual and noteworthy event, no matter how small the majority. As Mercutio said, "tis not so deep as a well, nor so wide as a church door; but 'tis enough." New Hampshire can hardly be called a representative State, so far as elections go, nor should we estimate the result too highly as an evidence of public opinion. There were many local circumstances in New Hampshire calculated to distract and weaken the established party organizations—the Republican especially; but the fact that the Administration did not succeed in rallying the party, shows that, in New England, it possesses diminished authority.

Advices from Arizona state that the Hualapais Apaches declare their willingness to return to their old grounds and obey all the orders of General Crook, but they say they will "all die before they will go to the Colorado River reservation. If the troops want to fight them they must expect a big battle." On the 10th inst., the Apaches stole a quantity of live stock from Simon Sanchez and Francisco Romero, near Sueson. A party of men pursued the thieves, and a fight ensued, in which Sanchez was killed by the Indians.

A terrible murder is reported from Knoxville, which occurred at Beaver Creek on Saturday night last. Two ruffians, named Duncan and Webb, from Anderson County, went to the house of Richard Reynolds, tied him, took his wife out and raped her, then offered to release him if he would pay \$400. Failing in this they shot and killed him. The murderers have not yet been arrested.

Among the last words of Mr. Sumner were these: "Take care of my Civil Rights Bill." It is not a little curious that, immediately after his death, his body suffered such rapid discoloration that embalming was almost impossible. What a strange thing it was, that the fanatical negro-worshipper should have turned black at last.

The closing of Philadelphia saloons on Sunday has caused much distress in certain circles. It is alleged that 60,000 habitual topers have been thrown out of employment, and great suffering must necessarily ensue.
