**A SCHOOL MISTRESS BRINGS A PUPIL.** The Eldora (Iowa) Ledger, of this week, says: "Mr. Smith, mail carrier between Grundy Center and Union, brings tidings of a fatal case of punishment by a school teacher. His story is that on Wednesday of last week, a school mistress in Fairfield township undertook to chastise one of her pupils, a boy about fifteen years of age. The boy made a fierce resistance, and the tide of conflict began to set in against the female disciplinarian. Gathering a heavy chair which was near, she lifted it high over her head, and with a sweeping "master stroke" brought it down upon the devoted head of the recalcitrant student, settling his resistance and his earthly existence at a single blow."

**THE LARGEST STEAMERS IN THE WORLD.**—The largest steamers in the world are the Great Eastern, (owned by the International Telegraph Construction and Maintenance Company,) 678 feet long, 77 feet broad; the City of Peking, (Pacific Mail Steamship Company,) 6,000 tons, 423 feet long, and 48 feet broad; the Liguria, (Pacific Steam Navigation Company,) 4,820 tons, 460 feet long, and 45 broad; the Britannic, (White Star,) 4,750 tons, 455 feet long, and 45 broad; the City of Richmond, (Inman,) 4,600 tons, 453½ feet long, and 43 beam; the Bothnia, (Cunard,) 4,500 tons, 425 feet long, and 43½ feet broad.

**BOSS TWEED'S LAWS TO BE REPEALED.** The Comptroller of New York city, in a communication of some length, calls the attention of the Mayor to a number of acts passed during the Tweed reign in 1870 and 1871, imposing heavy burdens on the city, which ought to be repealed or materially amended. It is said that immediate legislative action in this respect will yet save New York several millions of dollars.
