LOOK OUT FOR PEDDLERS—This County is infested by sharpers, who travel in two-horse vehicles, drive fine stock and carry quite an assortment of goods. They generally go in pairs; they are always French—only one will speak English. One of them always has a dead brother, or other relative, that he is particularly anxious to carry back to France for burial. The goods have to be sold, or given away. By arousing sympathy for the dead brother, and exhibit calico at two cents per yard, they take in some of our best men. They relieved some of the Thickety people, in Union County, of about \$1,000 a few days ago. To every one owning a few greenbacks we would say, let these men alone. They will most certainly cheat you.—Cor. Carolina Spartan.

Gen. Butler, who is now trying a case at Salem, has been questioned by a representative of a Boston paper as to his opinion regarding President Grant's veto of the inflation bill. The General said he did not want to be interviewed, but he would say that the veto was a great surprise to himself as well as to others. He had expected the President would sign the bill, and had not entertained a doubt that he would not do so. He had not read the veto, but could not see how President Grant could get around his own act of last fall in issuing \$20,000,000 of the reserve. In fact, he said he did not understand it, unless President Grant had "gone back on himself."

One of the four negro men in our jail, sentenced to be hanged, has died. His name was Patrick West. He was to have been executed on the 5th of June. Two of the remaining three have been baptized in the jail. The first execution, that of Henry Kilcrease, is to take place on the 22d of May.

The finding of the board of officers convened to investigate the charges against Lieutenant Benner, of improper conduct, while in command of a detachment of troops, at Yorkville, a few weeks since, has been forwarded to the Commanding General.

A young negro girl accidentally hung herself at Hillsboro township, Marion County, on the 23d instant, by entangling her neck in several skeins of yarn, which were hung to a pole in her mother's house.

On Monday evening last, an accident occurred to the up train, between Anderson and Walhalla, by which two passenger cars were thrown from the track and the second class slightly damaged.

A difficulty occurred at Holland's Store, Anderson County, on the 26th, between a party of young men; when one of them, named Reid, shot a German, Edward Girsabeck, so severely, that his life is despaired of.

A Boston despatch says the European and North American Railroad bridge at Mattawamkeal, was destroyed by fire Wednesday, caused by sparks from a passing train coming from St. John. Travel is seriously interrupted.

The Hon. Henry Buist, Gen. W. G. DeSaussure and Mr. N. Levin, Sr., are the delegates appointed to attend the Supreme Council of Masons of the Thirty-third Degree, in Baltimore, next week, from Charleston.

The survey of the Greenville and Asheville route has been ordered and will be commenced at once. Major W. S. Green, Chief Engineer of the Savannah and Memphis Road, will superintend the survey.

Henry Maller, a clerk employed in an intelligence office, 86 Greenwich street, New York, was beaten to death Tuesday evening, by his employer, Earnest Maller. Maller was arrested.

The recent heavy rains in York and Chester have somewhat retarded farming.

The floral fair in Charleston was opened on Wednesday, and proved to be a brilliant success.

Two negro boys quarreled the other day, at Kingsville, and one of them was killed by the other.

A daily mail route has been established from Easy Station, on the Air-Line Road, to Pickens Court House.

It is feared that the recent storm has seriously affected the peach crop of Delaware.

A. Howard, Jr., a bank officer of Onno, Wis., has decamped with \$40,000 in bank deposits.
