BITTER ALMONDS.—A jury in London has brought in a verdict censuring the use of a sample of burnt almonds in confectionery. The evidence is that these almonds were bitter, and that when steeped in water they yielded prussic acid. The question is now raised whether the use of bitter for sweet almonds in confectionery cannot be made a criminal offence, and prosecutions are to be instituted for that purpose. This whole sugar-plum question should be carefully considered, as it largely affects the health of our children.

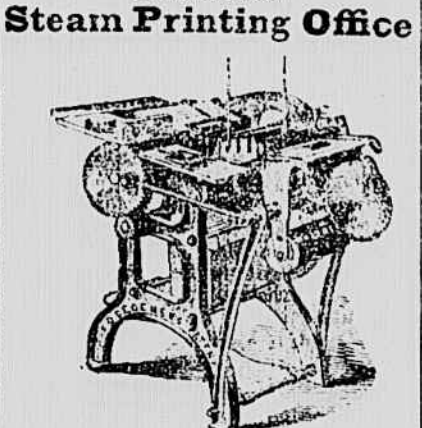

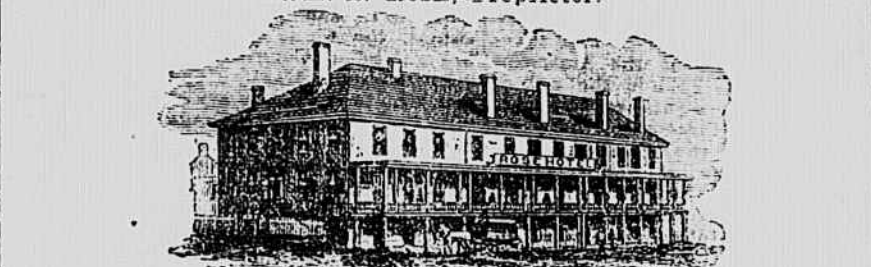
