"Nurses."—A writer of a communication in a New York evening paper predicts that the young people of this country are soon to tire of reading novels and foolish love-stories; and, as a revolution of this kind would put many clever persons out of employment, he wants the writers of light literature to turn their attention to a new field which is opening to the energies of such of them as may feel inclined to change their occupation. "Nursing" is the new vocation he points out to them; not the care of mewing babes, but the work so necessary in restoring to health maturated and more servicable persons. His suggestions seem to be directed more particularly to female writers, and he declares that educated nurses are becoming a need of the times. As to the truth of an assertion that educated nurses of both sexes are much needed, there is no doubt; but that young people are to become weary of the seductive short story; that they will tire of the excitements of the to-be-continued record of the adventures of Reginald De Montmorency and Imogene Tralyngoyne; that they are to come to look upon "fire-breathing Bill, the Terror of the War-path," as an unnecessary publication, will not be readily believed by careful observers. At any rate, the demand for such reading is not likely to fall off sufficiently to lead the present crop of writers of American fiction far away from their chosen occupation. The most sanguine advocate of a system, looking to the development of the nursing talent of the country, can scarcely hope to draw Mrs. Southworth, or Sylvanus Cobb, Jr., or Ned Buntline, into a hospital, and until there is a scheme that will bring about some such result, the maturer portion of the public will take little interest in the theories of persons like the Post writer.

THE Treasurer of the State is now prepared to fund, at the Treasury, in Columbia, S. C., the Bonds and Stocks of the State authorized by the Legislature under the Funding Act, approved December 22, 1873, into the Consolidation Bonds and Stocks. The following classes of Bonds and Stocks are authorized to be funded: STOCKS. Revolutionary War Claims. Charleston Fire Loan. Construction State Capital. Funding Past Due Interest and Principal. Conversion State Securities.

BONDS. Charleston Fire Loan. Construction State Capital. Aid to Blue Ridge Railroad. Funding Past Due Interest and Principal. Redemption Bills Receivable. Payment Interest Public Debt. Funding Bills Bank of State. Relief of Treasury. Land Commission.

The following bonds, issued under Act of March 23, 1869, entitled "Loan for the Conversion of State Securities," are also authorized to be funded into "Consolidation Bonds," they having been duly exchanged and represented by bonds on file: DENOMINATION \$1,000, NUMBERED IN RED. Numbers 1 to 519, inclusive. Numbers 521 to 1,130, inclusive. Numbers 2,151 to 2,175, inclusive.

The Legislature has declared that the remainder of the "Conversion Bonds" were put upon the market without any authority of law, and are absolutely null and void.

The funding law referred to above requires that the holders of the above Bonds and Stocks should exchange them, with the accrued interest to January 1, 1874, for "Consolidation Bonds and Stocks," at fifty per centum of their face value.
