The people of Icelan I for a thousand years have been famed for their simple virtues and a civilization and learning, strangely in contrast with the bleak desolation of their rugged island. The national character was strikingly dis-played in their celebration of their millennial anniversary, which began on the 2d ultimo, continuing several days. The Republic of Iceland was first organized in 874, so that this year completes the millennium of its national existence. The ancient Republic was betrayed to Norway in 1241, and passed under its rule in 1264. By the union of Denmark and Norway in 1380, its sovereignty passed to Denmark, where it has since continued, and the feeling of loyalty is very strong among the Icelanders, although they detest the Danes. The millennial anniversary was signalized by a visit of King Christian of Denmark and the promulgation of a new constitution, by which Iceland secures local independence and release from the taxation of Denmark. The first day's celebration consisted of a visit by the King to the cathedral in Reikiavik, where, after a sermon, a noble anthem, both music and words composed by Icelanders in honor of the day, was sung with remarkable power and sweetness, the emotions of the audi-ence responding to the words, so that tears of joy flowed down their cheeks. Later in the day a banquet to the King was given, in which he gave the first toast to the honor of old Iceland in the true Norse style. As he touched the goblet to his lips the cannon boomed and the people cheered. In the evening the people of town gathspeeches closed the day. Bayard Taylor contributed a fine ode, "America to Iceland," which was rendered into Icelandic by one of their poets and sung on the occasion. For several days the celebration continued, marked throughout by a dignity and simplicity surrounding it with more true grandeur than could have been conveyed by the greatest pomp or elabo ration of display.


