MURDER MOST FOUL.—We learn privately of a foul murder which was perpetrated some days ago, in Rutherford County. It appears that one Joe Hodge and a fellow named Hyder, both attaches of the Rutherford County Ku Klux hunting gang, bought some stock from two cattle drovers. After some time they took up a suspicion that the drovers were not the lawful owners of the stock, and started after them, both taking different roads. Hodge went to a negro cabin and made the darkey take his gun and go with him. Suddenly they came up with the drovers, and Hodge, with drawn pistol, ordered them to surrender. They made some demur, whereupon Hodge fired, and severely wounded one of the men. The other tried to fire, but failing to do so, closed with Hodge, who broke the handle of his pistol in the melee. The latter then shouted to the negro to come and shoot his antagonist, which the negro did—placing his gun at the man's breast, and blowing his heart in pieces while Hodge held him. Such are the facts as reported. The other drover is not expected to live. Hodge went before a Radical magistrate and gave a small bond for his appearance. He is one of the Loganite creatures that helped to maltreat the so-called Ku Klux in 1871.—*Charlotte Observer.*

The Outrage Convention has decided to appoint a permanent committee which shall be stationed in Washington this winter for the purpose of furnishing Congress with outrages enough to justify additional reconstruction. Jeff.
