**SPANISH INTRIGUES.**—A correspondent of the Boston Advertiser, who has apparently had exceptional opportunities for knowing the intrigues of the Spanish Bourbons in Paris, says he was told by Queen Isabella, three months ago, that the "coot had been enormous, but the result would be apparent before the winter had passed." It took \$1,000,000 to convert Serrano, and the Queen is said to have spent in all about \$3,000,000. To raise this sum, she has had recourse to every possible expedient, even to selling her jewels and lace. The Duc de Montpensier also loaned \$1,000,000 to Don Carlos, in hope to further the claims of his wife to the throne, and there is general rejoicing in French circles that he has lost it outright. Montpensier has also secured the love letters of the queen mother, having bribed Don Francois d'Assis, her ex-husband, to steal them for the reward of a valuable diamond. By this infamous means he expects, it is supposed, to overthrow Alfonso's legitimacy.

**AN ACTRESS DYING OF STARVATION.**—The New York Sun says that during a recent rehearsal of Henry V. at Booth's Theatre, in that city, one of the supernumeraries, a delicate, pale-faced woman, fell to the floor in a fainting condition. When raised up and asked if she was ill, she replied, "I am starving." It has been three days since I tasted food." Mr. H. C. Jazett, one of the proprietors, was informed of the incident, and in a moment he was in a neighboring restaurant, giving an order for a hearty meal for the famishing supernumerary. When the girl had appeased her hunger, Miss Wells, an actress, went among the actors and actresses, and collected forty dollars for the sufferer. She took her to her lodgings and found there the girl's husband dying of consumption, and her mother and four little children, all suffering from the want of food. The actress, who had not been on the stage before, was the sole support of the family.

**REVENUE.**—Connecticut receives a large revenue from savings banks and mutual insurance companies—those received for last year amounting in the first instance to \$509,103.20, and in the last named to \$627,190.08.

Prof. Wilson, of Baltimore, Md., says of this Guano: "By a critical examination of the analysis of the various cargoes you have imported, a striking feature is the great regularity in the per centage of the important constituents, essential for the production of all crops."

Prof. F. A. Genth, of Philadelphia, Penn., says: "The Guano is evidently of animal origin, and the minute bones which were discovered in the same, indicate that it is the result of the decay of bats, mice, &c. The quantity of organic matter which is still present is about 12 per cent., and this yields about 24 per cent. of ammonia. A portion of the nitrogen is present as nitric acid, of which about 3 per cent. were found. All the nitrogen present would be equivalent to about 34 per cent. of ammonia. The phosphoric acid in the Guano averaged about 12 1/2 per cent., equal to 27.3 per cent. of Bone Phosphate. A considerable quantity of the phosphoric acid, however, is present as so-called neutral Phosphate of Lime, which, being slightly soluble in water, renders the Guano as quick in its action as a corresponding quantity of Superphosphates would do. The small per centage of potash which was found in analysis adds to its value. From all the experiments which I have made of the Guanahani Guano no doubt can exist that it is a valuable manure."

Prof. H. C. White, of the Georgia State Agricultural Society, says: "As shown by the analysis, this Guano contains, in good proportion, all the elements which are generally considered as of value for plant food, and the forms and combinations in which they are present are such as to render them available to and assimilable by the plant. I should judge that the proper use of this article for purposes of fertilization would be attended with great profit."

Prof. Charles U. Shepard, Jr., in a recent analysis of this Guano, says: "This Guano (of animal origin) would appear from its physical and chemical properties to answer every reasonable expectation of a commercial manure."
