Telegraphic--Foreign News.
Paris, April 22.—The *Motivier* says Thiers will be elected to the Senate by many departments, and may possibly be elected President of that body, which position he is sure to hold for life.
London, April 22.—A heavy seat-holder in Her Majesty's Opera House, has obtained an injunction restraining Moody and Saukey from using the building for revival purposes.
CITY OF MEXICO, April 22, via HAVANA, April 22.—The latest session of the present Congress was opened by President Lerio de Tejada, with a speech. The President said the relations of Mexico with foreign powers were friendly. In accordance with the recent amendment to the Constitution, a Senate would be organized in September. The Executive had fulfilled all the requirements of the constitutional amendments and the reform laws, but old prejudices and the spirit of bigotry still lingered. Some persons, by artfully creating an unreasonable excitement, had given occasion or pretext for the formation of small armed bands in parts of Michoaca and Jalisco. They pretended to believe the Mexicans would allow themselves to be deprived of the glorious results of the victories they had purchased with their blood, of those ideas and principles, whose incorporation in the Constitution and laws of the country elevated the republic to a place among the most liberal and civilized people. The President stated that measures would be submitted, making education compulsory, providing for a normal college for female teachers. Col. Tom Scott and party have arrived at the capital.

Telegraphic--American News.
WASHINGTON, April 22.—Special Agent Park, who was detailed to investigate the affairs of the Ferdinand Custom House, in consequence of the collector, Henry Hazen, having absconded, reports to the Department that he has examined Hazen's accounts and finds a deficiency of \$1,684.28, but adds that this deficiency will probably be somewhat increased, after a few days, from the fact that many of the checks which Hazen drew just before he left were for compensation for services rendered for the Government, and which had not reached the United States Treasury at New York before the balance then on hand had been exhausted by some of the fraudulent checks which he had issued. Hazen, after leaving Ferdinand, proceeded to Savannah from which city he addressed a letter to his deputy collector and another to his wife. Since then nothing has been heard of his whereabouts.

LEWES, DEL., April 22.—The Presbytery of New Castle rejected the General Assembly's overture, regarding rotary eldership—46 to 14.
OMAHA, April 22.—The Union Pacific is possible except for six miles, over which trains transfer.
HARTFORD, April 22.—Roswell C. Smith, author of Smith's grammar and other school books, is dead; aged seventy-eight.

NEW ORLEANS, April 22.—Owing to the railroad war, the fare, via the Jackson route, to New York is \$35; reductions to other points proportionate.
SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—The steamer Venture was wrecked at Point Sur; total loss, but passengers saved; the cargo will be saved with fair weather. A burning steamer was seen off Santa Barbara, firing distress guns, and a schooner has gone to her relief.

NEW YORK, April 22.—A despatch to the Sun from Washington, says the Supreme Court will adjourn on the 3d of May. Although there has been no formal conference or vote on the Louisiana case, which involves the constitutionality of the Enforcement Act, there is good reason to believe that this tribunal, by a most decided majority, will sustain the decision of Justice Bradley in the Court below, and declare all this legislation to be void and without any constitutional warrant. The opinion will be reserved until the meeting of the Court next fall.
CHICAGO, April 22.—In the billiard match, Miller beat Hos and Parker beat Rhories; Shaw beat Honing 200 to 90. Gallagher beat Liverman; Carter beat McAfee 200 to 45—making the highest average of the tournament. He counted as follows: 18, 11, 15, 23, nought, 20, 11, 72, 30. Time of game, 55 minutes. Burleigh beat Maggioni 200 to 164.

New York, April 22.—The steamer W. A. Scholten, from Rotterdam, has arrived with her propeller damaged, starboard bow stove and fire compartment filled with water, having encountered several fields of ice and icebergs; at one time she was completely surrounded by icebergs.
Jessie Duval's cotton mills, at Zanesville, Ohio, last evening, were damaged by fire to the extent of \$25,000; insured.

NEW ORLEANS, April 22.—The Senate, to-day, resolved itself into a court of impeachment, to impeach Charles Clinton, of high crimes and misdemeanors in office, and notified the House of their action. A committee was appointed to prepare rules to govern the Senate when sitting as a court of impeachment, and a joint resolution passed, suspending Auditor Clinton from office pending impeachment.
KEY WEST, April 22.—Advices from Havana report 1,000 well-mounted insurgents entered the jurisdiction of Sagua, on Friday last, and burned seven large plantations in the district of Quernada de Los Guines. They met with no resistance. Manuel Suarez, formerly an officer of the Spanish army, was in command. A rebel cavalry corps, estimated to be 1,500 strong, is operating under General Salguero, in the Eastern part of the jurisdiction of Colon. It was supposed, at Havana, that reinforcements had been received by Captain-General Valmaseda, sufficient to prevent the insurgents from over-running Colon and to check their progress Westward for the present.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The steamer Swatara was at Melbourne, 22d February. Attorney-General Williams has resigned; it takes effect on the 15th May. No successor named. Williams goes home—hoping to come back as Senator from Oregon. Nothing tangible can be obtained regarding the rumored retray of Delano as Secretary of the Interior. Nothing authentic received regarding the burning of the steamer off Santa Barbara. She fired twenty-five guns; her stern was burning when the fog hid her. The Stonington, of the Boston line, sunk at her moorings, where she was repairing; forty workmen aboard escaped. She went down in a heavy swell in five minutes.
 The ninth annual convention of the National Board of Fire Underwriters met to-day; fifty companies represented; proceedings preliminary.
 Sir Edward Thornton has over 100 cases referred to him, as umpire, by the Mexican Commission, and will not reach the test case deciding responsibility of sacking Bagdad, at the mouth of the Rio Grande, very soon.

Probabilities.—For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, partly cloudy weather and main near the coast, with Northerly to Easterly winds, slowly rising temperature and rising barometer during the night.
RALPHIGH, N. C., April 22.—Jacob B. Rumbough, cigar-maker, of Charlotteville, Va., more recently of Lynchburg and Richmond, shot himself fatally in the head here, this evening, with a small pistol; cause, failure to obtain work and disheartened in consequence. He leaves a wife and three children in Lynchburg.

New York, April 22.—Beecher's testimony was concluded to-day. Half a dozen witnesses were examined to-day, regarding the general morals and wives of black-mailers.
 The Polish press report continued defections among Roman Catholic congregations in Prussian Poland, and the adoption, by many of them, of the Greek Church. The cause is said to be the promulgation of the doctrines of the immaculate Conception and the infallibility of the Pope. These and other similar incidents call to mind the remark made by the Cardinal Prince Schvazenberg: "This new doctrine will assuredly cause a great falling away from the Catholic Church."
