DICTIONARIES.—The victims of the lately prevalent orthographical mania will be interested in the following announcement:

"The Librarian of Congress says in a recent letter upon orthography: So far as the Library of Congress is concerned, Webster has never been followed in orthography in printing its catalogues, reports or other documents. On the contrary, wherever proofs from the Congressional printing office embody the innovations upon English orthography which Webster introduced, they are invariably returned with corrections restoring the established spelling, as represented by Worcester and the usage of all great English writers."

In our distinguished judgment, neither one of these dictionaries is worth the paper on which it is printed. They both present examples and samples of shoddy literary work of which the American people have reason to be ashamed. It is true both are very bulky, and contain a vast number of words, and illustrations to correspond, but when one wishes to ascertain the real radical meaning of a word, its history and growth, he might as well look into an algebra as into either one of the unabridged editions. There are, moreover, a great number of common words adopted from other languages and in current acceptance and employment, which cannot be found in either dictionary named. The definitions of both Webster and Worcester are also frequently unphilosophical and to that extent inadequate and incorrect. It is a great pity that this country has no association of scholars like the French Academy, to undertake a great dictionary of the English tongue, tracing out the history and development of each word, fixing its etymology and giving its authorized orthography. It may fairly be doubted whether any one man, however learned and laborious, is competent for such a task. Mr. Littré prepared such a dictionary of the French language, but neither Dr. Webster nor Dr. Worcester had the head or the hand of M. Littré.

A HOPEFUL MISSOURI BOY.—Mr. Pomeroy Beeding, a fast son of Mr. E. L. Beeding, living in Cambridge, Mo., was trapped last Wednesday, in an attempt to murder his father, mother and brother-in-law. Mr. Beeding is one of the wealthiest and most popular men in the State, and being desirous of his son getting a good education, sent him to Fayette, Mo. This being a small place, he thought his son would not get the opportunity of practicing his rascality. After Pomeroy had been there for a few weeks, his father went to visit him, and found he had gotten deeply in debt, and was engaged to be married to a young lady, who broke her engagement for this purpose. Mr. Beeding thinking this was the wrong life for a school boy to lead, took him home. The boy wished to marry, but he had no money, not of age, and had no means of getting any. How was he to get it? He finally agreed to kill his father, mother and brother-in-law, who constituted the family. To do this, he tried to get Mr. Stanton, a man not of the highest standing in the world, who lived just across the river from him, to assist him. He told Mr. Stanton he would give him \$1,500 if he would do it, and told him that he could get a man in St. Louis to do it for \$500, but was afraid the St. Louis man would kill the wrong one. Mr. Stanton told Pomeroy to meet him in a log house, on a certain night, and they would proceed from there to kill them. Mr. Stanton had no idea of killing them, but was going to tell Mr. Beeding of his son's designs. Thinking that Mr. B. would not believe him, Mr. Stanton got two men to accompany him to the log house, so as to have some proof. After they had arrived at the house, Pomeroy commenced telling Stanton, and then the man from underneath came in, grabbed him, and took him to his father. Mr. Beeding had him horse-whipped, gave him a draft for fifty dollars, and discarded him. Pomeroy went to Glasgow, got his draft paid, went for his trunk, and went to St. Louis, since which nothing has been heard from him.
