THE TERRORS OF THE WITNESS-BOX.—Mr. Beecher's careful way of testifying reminds a correspondent of the New York Evening Post of an anecdote of Admiral Bailey, as follows: Bailey was once summoned as a witness in a civil suit—a position altogether new to him. His anxiety was increased by the warnings of his friends, who were constantly telling him to be on his guard, as the lawyers would bother him, and make him contradict himself and appear to be a liar. The old fellow had a sleepless night before the day of trial, and when he entered the witness-box it was with a nervousness such as he had never experienced in going into battle. When the first question, "What is your name?" was proposed to him, his hands fidgeted tremulously about and the perspiration broke out on his brow. He was evidently in deep and perplexing thought, and remained silent. The question was repeated with emphasis: "I ask, what is your name, sir?" With a mighty effort the old Admiral jerked out the result of his deliberations, "The-odo-rus Bailey," adding, impressively, "or words to that effect."

The State Department has received, through British sources, information that the brig James Birney, carrying the American flag, while at Howe's group of islands, in the Pacific, in September last, was captured by the natives and one-half the crew murdered, while the remainder escaped in the ship's boat. In the list of officers and seamen furnished it is evident they were all British subjects, which opinion is not only confirmed by the Navy Department, but the suspicion is that the James Birney is an English vessel sailing under the American colors, engaged in stealing the natives of the group of islands visited, and that the natives only defended themselves against the intruders.
