Col. Hatch has reported to Gen. Ord, commanding the Department of Texas, that two of a party of United States soldiers, sent out from Ringgold barracks, to watch for Mexican raiders, have been killed and their comrades arrested, charged with the murder of a Mexican killed in the affray. The statement is made that the Mexican population East of the Rio Grande is in league with the raiders, hence the arrest of the soldiers. The Secretary of War has addressed a note to the Governor of Texas, stating that President Grant intimates that the Government troops, stationed on the border for the protection of citizens, will be withdrawn, if they are subjected to such indignities while doing their duty. In view of a prospective raid by Cortina, this action would seem harsh and unjustifiable, but the United States troops stationed on the border are entirely inadequate, numerically, to cope with the border of grassars who go and come of adequate, numerically, to cope with the hordes of greasers who go and come as they please. If the troops are withdrawn, it will doubtless lead to a more thorough and compulsory organization of the Texas militia. For some time, the American ranche-owners have had their own organized forces to repel invasion, and in the event of an increased system of raiding, the Texas Governor will have to order out the milities. system of raiding, the Texas Governor will have to order out the militia generally in the Western part of the State, which, of course, will lead to positive hostilities on a large scale. Four companies of Texas volunteers are now kept in readiness along the border to meet raiders. Some of the ranche-owners have supplied themselves with artillery and fixed ammunition at their own expense, and there is every reason to believe that every effort will be made to restore quiet.
