SUNDAY .- The following ordinance, we are requested by Chief Nixon to say, will be rigidly enforced hereafter: AN OBDINANCE FOR THE BETTER OBSERVANCE

OF THE SABBATH DAY.
SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Columbia, in Council assembled, That from and after Council assembled, That from and after the passage and promulgation of this ordinance, any merchant, shop-keeper or vender of wine, spirituous or malt liquors, in any quantity, either under a tavern or retail license, who shall keep his, her or their store, shop, bar-room or saloon open for the transaction of business on the Sabbath day, shall be subject to a penalty of not more then forty ject to a penalty of not more than forty-five dollars, nor less than twenty dollars, at the discretion of the City Council of Columbia, for each and every violation

of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. And be it further ordained. That any person who shall publicly work or labor, or employ any other person to do so, on the Sabbath day, (except in cases of emergency.) shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars for each and every offence.




