

Telegraphic--Foreign News.

BELFAST, July 9.—A farewell banquet was given to the American team this afternoon. Mr. Robert Thompson, a prominent merchant, presided, and made a speech, wishing the Americans every success. Mayor Lindsay entered near the close of the banquet and presented Col. Gildersleeve with the cup won by him. The Mayor said the citizens of Belfast were glad the cup was going to America. Col. Gildersleeve returned thanks, and declared he would ever consider the cup his most important trophy. After further speeches and toasts, the company rose and the visitors proceeded to the pier to take the steamer for Glasgow, escorted by the Mayor and a delegation of citizens. Thousands of people lined the docks and piers to see them off, and there was loud and hearty cheering as the vessel steamed out. The party will visit the Scottish lakes to-morrow, and expect to arrive in Edinburgh in the evening. Col. Gildersleeve declines the proposition for team matches. The club adheres to its determination that it would shoot but one team match.

MADRID, July 9.—Official despatches report that the Carlist General Dorregaray, after reaching the villages of Agnaga and Casbas, at the foot of Mount Guara, succeeded in entering Aragon, near the Pyrenees. Three brigades are actively pursuing him. The *Imparcial* says Don Carlos and staff have hurriedly decamped from Trevino to avoid pursuit.

The Alfonsists relieved Vittoria and entered the city on Wednesday. The Carlists have been defeated at Trevino, with a loss of 400 killed and sixty prisoners. They are retreating to the Northern part of Alava.

The Carlist General Dorregaray is being actively pursued by the Alfonsists. It is believed he will attempt to take refuge on French territory.

PARIS, July 10.—The loss in Lisieux and vicinity is 2,000,000f. Floods are subsiding.

MADRID, July 10.—Among the prisoners taken by the Alfonsists at Cantarrega is a Carlist Brigadier-General and 170 officers.

Moscow, July 10.—The King of Sweden has arrived in this city.

LONDON, July 10.—The *Times*, having published some strictures on an address in favor of Henry Ward Beecher, drawn up by the Congregational ministers, Rev. Dr. Alex. Raleigh, one of the signers, has written a letter in reply. He vindicates the action of himself and his friends in signing the address; he never meant to commit any portion of the non-conformists to his views. He then proceeds to declare that it is not sound principle to assert, because a man may be blameable in lighter things, he is not to be approached with an expression of sympathy by those who are unspcakably glad to believe he has shown himself innocent of a heavier charge, with complete success. The letter concludes as follows: "I never supposed that in signing the document, I was expressing any opinion on Mr. Beecher's sayings or doings in general. I believe the Christian sentiment of England will unanimously lament and condemn some things which Mr. Beecher acknowledges in the course of the trial. He has blamed himself without stint. Now I believe he has recovered himself, and will stand in honor and usefulness as formerly."

The *Times*' Madrid despatch says events of great importance are looked for.

The *Times*' special despatch from Paris says that the *Memorial Diplomatique* newspaper announces that the Turkish students in Paris have been ordered home, and that with the money hitherto devoted to the education of these youths, Turkey will establish an institution at Constantinople offering equal advantages to those of Paris.

VALPARAISO, May 25.—A terrible Northern occurred, during which many lives were lost and vessels wrecked. Nothing could withstand the awful sea that was set up by the violence of the wind; boats were knocked about and upset like cockle-shells. The Chilean man-of-war *Valdivia* did not get up steam in time, broke from her moorings, and drove down upon the men-of-war *Thalaba* and *Esmeralda*, causing to both vessels great damage in their fore-parts—the *Esmeralda* threatening to upset; her chains were let go, and after drifting about the harbor and damaging several other vessels, was finally run ashore to prevent her from sinking. Chili papers give the following additional details of the lighters and boats, the last two probably exceeding 100 in number. The destruction of baths and other property afloat is not enumerated. The amount will be very heavy. The railway was also much damaged. A letter from Salazar, May 23, to the *Barrangville Shipping List*, in relation to the earthquakes, says, from several sources, we hear that the Venezuela side has suffered, if possible, more severely than the Colombian, and while it is possible that these statements may yet be exaggerated, nevertheless in its mildest aspect it cannot be less than an awful catastrophe.

MADRID, July 10.—An official despatch to the Government gives the following details of military operations: The fighting on Wednesday, near Sanclares, in the province of Alva, lasted five hours. The Carlists were under Penua and Carlos; they numbered eighteen battalions of infantry, twelve guns and 450 cavalry. The loss was 140 killed, many wounded and a number taken prisoners. The Alfonsist General Contreras twice brilliantly charged the Navarrese with a body of eighty lancers, sowing death within their ranks and creating a panic. The railroad between Vittoria and Miranda has been restored, and that between Valencia and Vinares will shortly be re-opened. General Jovellar is at Morella, province of Castellon de la Plana. Weiler's division is endeavoring to overtake Dorregaray. It has orders

to immediately attack, if it comes up with him. All the fords of the river Gallego in Aragon are guarded.

TOLEDO, July 10.—The Mayor of this city decided to attend the international banquet at Guildhall, London, on the 29th. The Mayors of Hamilton and Halifax also accepted the invitation; Mayors of Quebec and Montreal have declined.

HAMILTON, CANADA, July 10.—The black tongue is raging among the cattle South of this place.

BOSTON, July 10.—The "Prince Hal" Grand Lodge of Colored Masons, of this city, has received official notice of its recognition by the Lodge of Germany.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 10.—It is believed there are imposters in Northern markets buying goods under assumed names of reliable North Carolina merchants. It is thought the device used to commit swindle is to represent the purchases to be for a "branch store," and thus avoid shipment to the regular address of the reliable merchant.

CAMDEN, N. J., July 10.—President Grant, accompanied by Hon. Hamilton Fish, Geo. W. Childs and several other gentlemen, arrived at Camden, from Long Branch, and were met by Gov. Hartranft, Hon. A. E. Borie, Col. Fred. Grant, Collector Comly and others, who escorted them to the revenue-cutter in waiting at the wharf, which immediately started for Cape May.

LAWRENCE, MASS., July 10.—The Atlantic Cotton Mills, 1,250 operatives, shut down at noon to-day, for eight weeks; the operatives lose \$80,000 in wages by the shut down.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Panama advices of the 2d, say public attention has been diverted to the late earthquakes at Cuzco, of which no additional information has been received. The people and Federal officials were moving to aid the sufferers by a national commission, to do what was possible, and both houses of Congress had voted money for the purpose. A national aid committee has also been appointed to apply all funds received. Considering the state of lawlessness that was developing itself at the scene of the earthquake, disasters by the people pillaging the ruins of the damaged towns and cities, instead of aiding and protecting the unfortunate, as well as the disturbed political condition of the republic in general, President Perez has issued a decree to increase the national army to 3,000 men.

GRANTEEVILLE, July 10.—Two children, while playing on the track of the Nassau and Aton Railroad, were run over; one killed and the other fatally wounded.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Commodore G. H. Cooper, in command at Pensacola Navy Yard, telegraphed to the Navy Department, to-day, that there are no new cases yet of fever at quarantine there; the nine patients from the German bark *Von Moltke* are convalescent. No deaths have occurred since last despatch. There are no cases at the navy yard. A telegram received here, this morning, from Key West, reports three deaths from yellow fever and two new cases of the disease there yesterday.

Probabilities.—For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, falling or stationary barometer, South-west to South-east winds, continued warm, cloudy or partly cloudy weather and rain areas are probable.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Rev. S. D. Osgood, Secretary of the American Baptist Missionary Union, is dead.

ST. LOUIS, July 10.—The Constitutional Convention now in session at Jefferson City and the City Council of St. Louis have passed resolutions highly complimentary to the late Gen. Blair, and deeply deploring his death. The latter body will attend his funeral, and will co-operate with other organizations and individuals in showing respect to the deceased. Gov. Yardin and other State officers will also attend.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 10.—The Cotton States Congress assembles on Tuesday, 13th, in the hall of the House of Representatives. A large attendance is expected. A banquet will be given to the delegates on Wednesday night. Railroads throughout the South grant half rates to delegates. Gov. Brogden will deliver a welcome address, and T. H. Busbee extend the hospitalities of the city. The hotels entertain at reduced rates.

ATLANTA, July 10.—General Henry L. Benning, of Columbus, Ga., died to-day.

PORTLAND, ME., July 10.—A tremendous storm of rain, thunder and lightning broke over this city, this morning. The Catholic Church was struck, and though but little damage was done by lightning, the church was considerably injured by smoke and water. The First Baptist Church, new Payson Memorial Church and Chestnut Street Methodist Church all suffered more or less injury from the storm.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The Consul at Nassau reports the total loss of the American schooner *Almaretta*, from New York for New Orleans, at South Bonini Shoals, Bahamas; part of the cargo and ship's material and crew were taken to Nassau; among the cargo saved was 765 marble tomb-stones shipped to New Orleans for graves of Federal soldiers.
