

Telegraphic--Foreign News.

MADRID, July 13.—The draft of the Constitution provides that the Senate be composed of three classes; the first hereditary title; the second elected by popular corporations; the third nominated by the Crown.

LOXNDOX, July 13.—The usual Orange celebrations in Dublin, the towns throughout Ulster, and at Liverpool. Most of the meetings passed resolutions condemning home rule; no disturbance anywhere.

At the Moody and Sankey's farewell meeting, last night, 188 clergymen of the Church of England were present—four out-numbering those of any other denomination.

In the House of Lords, this evening, Earl Derby, Minister of State for the Foreign Department, in reply to a question put by Lord Penzance, said the German note to Belgium, dated February 3, 1875, laying down certain international principles, had no application to Great Britain.

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The President has returned to Long Branch from Cape May.

LOUISVILLE, July 13.—A special from Clarksville, Tenn., says two Irishmen attacked a negro with a knife; next morning, twenty negroes attacked the Irishmen, who refuted in a grocery store.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 13.—The citizens of Westville burned Corbin's saloon. Corbin is sick, but swears he will open another saloon when he recovers.

LAWRENCE, Mass., July 13.—A mob attacked the Orangemen, returning from a picnic. A dozen Orangemen, with ladies and children, disembarked at the steamer landing; several hundred Irish followed, shouting, jeering and finally throwing stones.

SANTANDER, July 12.—The Spanish steamer Bayonne has been wrecked near the village of Motrico, on the Biscayan coast; the crew were saved by Carlist fishermen, who, it is said, will be held as hostages, and the Carlists threaten to shoot them if the Royalists bombard any more coast towns.

LONDON, July 12.—Mr. Henry Parsons, Adjutant of the British team, telegraphs as follows, from Wimbledon: I regret to say that the Council will not allow the last proposed match for Saturday between the Americans and the representatives of the three British eights of 1874 and 1875, to be shot; we intend to offer the Americans a cup which they may take back with them and shoot for at home.

A Prussian war ship has been secretly engaged in taking soundings and mapping the coast of Jutland; an explanation is demanded from the Berlin Government.

PARIS, July 12.—In the Assembly, today, the university education bill was discussed clause by clause. All the amendments proposed by the Liberals have been rejected by narrow majorities, and the Clericals are jubilant over their success.

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 12.—To-day was observed by the Orangemen all over the province. No conflicts are reported.

As the train bound East on the Toledo, Wabash and Western Railroad was nearing Jacksonville, Ill., the morning of the 11th, the engine struck some cattle, which threw the train from the track, turning the engine upside down and holding the fireman, Roberts, and the engineer helpless beneath, while the steam poured over them.

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—The council of the Baptist clergymen, to investigate the charges against Rev. Mr. Bott, of the Twelfth Baptist Church, returned a verdict of not guilty; pastor altogether blameless.

CINCINNATI, July 13.—The streams are much swollen. Gordon & McClure's floating elevator was struck by a tree and sunk immediately, with four barges, containing 30,000 bushels of coal.

A number of other barges were torn from their moorings; loss estimated at \$25,000.

St. Louis, July 13.—At a meeting of the Democratic State Executive Committee, the following resolution was adopted: That in our opinion, the choice of St. Louis as the place of holding the next National Democratic Convention, would be an act of justice to the Democracy of the West; that in the magnificent new Merchants' Exchange, which can comfortably seat 15,000 persons, we have a hall amply sufficient for the convenience of members and spectators; that we urge upon the member of the National Committee for this State that he use his best endeavors to secure the selection of St. Louis, and we authorize him, in behalf of the Democracy of our State, to give assurance that they will pay the expenses of the convention, and in behalf of the citizens, that members will be accommodated with as much comfort and as little expense as they would be anywhere else, while our citizens would vie with each other in tendering generous hospitalities.
