AN ORDINANCE

To repeal an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to regulate Licenses for Taverns, Retailing Spirits, Liquors, Billiard Tables, and other purposes, herein mentioned," Ratified the 28th day of April, 1752, and to revise and reduce all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances repealed by the same.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Intendant and Assembly of the Town of Camden in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same, That the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to regulate Licenses for Taverns, Retailing Spirits, Liquors, Billiard Tables, and other purposes, herein mentioned," ratified the twenty-eighth day of April, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Two, be and the same is hereby repealed.

The same notwithstanding, that will prevail that have made the establishment so popular throughout the State.
