We have been surprised that with the amount of cotton bought here that we should not have more money on hand to accommodate our buyers. This would also induce farmers from other countries to bring their cotton here. There is also a demand to discount good paper and merchants and planters are forced to seek accommodation elsewhere. It is practicable and our merchants could soon have a Bank in operation if they would only unite. Newberry, Anderson, Chester, Winnsboro, Greenville, Darlington, all have Banks, and yet Camden, a larger place than two-thirds of them, ha none. Let us wake up on this subject






