Tax Returns 1884.

The books for receiving tax returns for the fiscal year 1884 will open at this office on Tuesday, the 1st day of May next, and be kept open daily (Sundays excepted) until the 20th day of June next. All persons liable for taxes, individually or as Agents, Attorneys, Factors, Husbands, Payents, Guardians, Truntees, Executors, Administrators, Receivers, or accounting officers.

Guardians, Trustees, Executors, Administrators, Receivers, or accounting officers are required to make returns according to law. Pailing to do so within the time precoribed, the Auditor will make returns for delinquents, from information, or by listing from the duplicate of 1883, the tamble property charged thereon against them with a penalty of 50 per cent, added thereto. No returns will be received after the 20th of June without the penalty, except in cases of sickness or absence from the County during the whole time of listing. There is to be no re-assessment of real estate this year, nevertheless returns must be made of same, noting all changes since last return.

All male persons between the age of 21 and 50 years are liable to poli tax of \$1.00; except these who are exempt by law, and are required to make returns whether they ewa property or not. No returns will be received at this office


