

rope-walk was 600 paces long, and was considered equal to any thing which England or France possesses of this kind. The conflagration was so violent that the Isle of L'ou, which is separated from the Catooe by a large basin, was covered with flames."

In a few days the hay harvest will be over, and the fineness of the weather has produced every where a manifest improvement in the growing crops of all sorts; so that we have the prospect before us of an abundant harvest. Similar accounts arrive from France and from the continent generally.

Extract of a letter from the Agents to Lloyd's at Buon's Agree dated 25th March.

"The Patriot ship Chacabuco and schr. San Marin (late American vessel Clifton and Davie) are all ready for sea, and will sail in a few days on a cruise. The former mounts thirty-four guns and 280 men, and the latter 18 guns and 150 men. It is said they are to proceed round the Cape, but we rather suspect their cruising ground will be off Cape St. Vincent. The San Martin is considered the last sailing vessel out of the U. States. The brig Savage of 18 guns which arrived here on the 18th inst. from Baltimore, is another of the squadron from America, and as she is heavily loaded with military stores, it is likely she will proceed to Valparaiso, the Conquereira, and I dependence have not yet sailed. A number of commissions for volunteers have lately been issued by the government, and forwarded by individuals to the U. States."

16. 1818 June 23.
Letters received this morning from Bahia mention that a British ship laden with gun powder was captured off Parauanudo by the Portuguese squadron.

23. June 23.
His Excellency the Minister of Police has been very seriously indisposed, and an intimation of his case was apprehended. His Excellency however, is much better, and out of all danger.

"Grain continues to fall in all the markets, and the rye harvest is begun."

"An article from Nuremberg of the 20th, says the Duke of San Carlos, instead of going to London, will proceed direct to Madrid. The Earl of Arden will succeed Lord C. heart at Petersburgh."

A Mail from Brussels arrived this morning. Quiet is restored in that City, and throughout Europe in the Ne. the Japs & in every other part, a decline in prices. The weather is delightful, and the harvest promises to be abundant.

BRUSSELS, June 20.
"By order of his Majesty the King, the hunger of this City was ordered to be put in active exercise; already at five o'clock this morning the select company of cavalry commanded active duty, and at noon the alarm. The other g. in arms & the guard are going to be organized.

The markets of to-d. have fully confirmed the hopes of the public, they were abundantly supplied, and the most perfect order was the result of the measures taken for this purpose. In the Corn Market Government had 600 bushels lectures of corn stored; the wheat was sold at 11 florins, and the rye at 6 florins."

"June 21.
The most perfect calm and tranquility has succeeded the agitations of which our City has been the theatre since the 18th. Order is wholly restored, and the alarms which are entertained by some persons, will be gradually dispelled by the prudent measures which the government has adopted. The circumstances are impellent—and on the other hand the experience of to-d. had lessened the quantity, on the other, no operators have speculated on the public distress, but if they do not make haste to sell the corn they have in their ware houses, the letat will soon cause it to show in the harvest, which is at hand will half all's reddit speculation."

Forman, from London, and 48 days from Cowes.

Treasury Chambers, 11th June.

GENTLEMEN—I am commanded by the lords commissioners of his majesty's treasury to signify to you their lordship's authority to permit the importation of corn, grain, meal, flour and rice, in any ship and from any country, until 1st Nov. 1817, inclusive, provided the importation of grain shall, during this period, continue legal, under the provisions of the Act. 55. Geo. 3, cap. 26. And I am to desire you will immediately cause public notice to be given hereof.
